**RELIGIOUS SERVICES**

**THE BAPTIST CHURCH**

At the morning service the Rev. A. C. Vincent preached an eloquent sermon on "The Bible", the occasion being Bible Society Sunday. Taking as his text Matthew 19:16: "Not do, and which can only be done with God all things are possible" he gave a vivid outline of the formation and aims of the British and Foreign Bible Society whose splendid object it is to give to all men the Bible in their own tongue, without note or comment. No Society save only the Church is dearer to Christians than this great society. The dauntless courage, the limitless faith, the splendid ideals of its founders are an inspiration to their followers to-day. The last annual report aptly entitled "The Impossible" is a twentieth century demonstration of the utter truth of the text of the day. The Bible Society is the handmaid of the Church and the arsenal of her missions. A strong appeal was made to the congregation for their generous support in the collection which is shortly to be made. Speaking to a large congregation in the evening Dr. Vincent commended a series of sermons on "The Message of the whirlwind". The theme of the evening was "The Eternity of God."

Included in the music of the day were Goss's anthem "O Saviour of the world," Maunders' "While the earth remaineth." At the morning service a gospel hymn, "The old rugged cross" given in solo and chorus added to the message of the occasion, while at the evening service the fine male quartette, Messrs. Quigley, Calder, Dingwell and Sterns gave a worshipful number. Sunday School had another day of large attendance, rather notable in the number of the older people present.

**TRINITY UNITED CHURCH**

The service yesterday morning was conducted by Rev. C. N. Brown with Rev. Dr. John Coburn of Toronto as special preacher. The text was "Ye are the light of the world"—words of Jesus addressed to His disciples, the founders of the Christian Church. It is the office of the Church to transmit to the world the divine light of which Christ is the great source. Every Christian congregation is required to shed abroad the light of our religion, but there are many things which the local church cannot do, and which can only be done by the cooperative effort of many such bodies.

The 7622 congregations of the United Church of Canada are organized to carry on a great work in many departments. The preacher made special reference to the educational service of the Church in training men for the ministry and carrying on colleges and schools of liberal culture. In foreign missions it has the status of a world Church; the sun never sets on its activities of worship and service.

In its home missions to the new Canadians, the Church preaches the gospel in no less than 28 languages. Interesting and touching stories were told of the Church's institutions for the rescue of boys, girls and young women who had fallen into evil ways. For the support of these and other great enterprises, an appeal is made for a special effort during the month of November. If the times are hard, this fact but makes the need the greater. The challenge is for sacrificial giving.

Rev. Dr. Ramsay preached at the evening service his subject being the life giving river of God's grace. In the morning the choir rendered the anthem "Teach Me, O Lord, the Way of Thy Statutes (Atwood); and in the evening "Taste and See, (Goss). At the evening service also, Miss Frances Wood sang the setting of "Lead Kindly Light" by D. Pugh Evans, and Mr. C. F. Connell the solo, "I Love to Hear My Saviour's Voice."

The adult bible class met yesterday afternoon for the first time since vacation. Rev. Dr. Coffin has again consented to act as instructor, and will carry on a study of the Book of Job. Dr. Coffin gave a very interesting introductory address on the literary forms of the Bible, its priestly, prophetic, and wisdom literature. Job is one of the wisdom books, and is a very profound study in dramatic form of certain great moral problems.
