DAIRY WORK FOR 1932 REVIEWED

Report Presented by Mr. W. L. Brenton, Superintendent, at Association's Annual Meeting

The following report was presented by Mr. W. L. Brenton, Dairy Superintendent at the annual meeting of the Dairy Association on Thursday:

I beg to submit my report for 1932, which report I trust shall intelligibly place before this annual convention of dairymen here assembled, the dairy work in this Province under my supervision.

As you fully realize, the season has been a trying one; the low prices received for butter and cheese, the keen competition for milk and cream supply between the several companies, the excessive gathering charges by much duplication on the same routes by teams or motor trucks, are some of the many obstacles to overcome before the industry is on a profitable basis.

The average low production of milk per cow, in our Island province, can only be remedied by weeding out the unprofitable cow and by the proper care and feeding of the average herds. Some few of our Dairy farmers who have been consistently following this procedure have, even this season been able to produce milk and cream at a profit in spite of low butter fat values. There is no doubt that low production per cow would be materially increased if the individual cow was properly fed and housed.

Whatever the breed or kind of cow cheap homegrown feeds are necessary. Pasture improvement is a big factor in cheaper production and should receive more careful consideration.

The producers today are not receiving as large a percentage of the receipts from dairy products as is their just due. Manufacturing charges must be reduced not by the reducing of the salaries of the creamery and factory men, but rather by the reasonable adjustment of territory, the amalgamation

or pooling of the resources of the smaller companies. Why should the farmer condone and often encourage the practice of a number of teams or trucks gathering milk and cream on the same route. Does not this increase the overhead charges, all of which goes back to the producer to shoulder? Not a few of our factories have been, by a depleted supply of raw products, paying out to the last cent to meet competing companies' prices, without building up a reserve fund to take care of the depreciation of the factory and its equipment which, in many instances, is now overdue. As all receipts are taken from the milk pail would it not be reasonable to have a full knowledge of just what each pail contains by adopting Cow Testing Rules and Regulations which has for the past number of years been conducted by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Mr. C. J. Cooke of Kensington and Mr. S. C. Wright of Carleton being the officials in charge for this province. The Honourable Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa, has just advised our Minister of Agriculture, Honourable Thomas MacNutt, that, in the future, this policy will be left to our Provincial Department of Agriculture; and I trust that as dairymen you will use your influence to see this important work will not be neglected but rather that all reasonable assistance be given such an important phase of the work.

In the early months of the year considerable portion of the time was given to attendance at the annual meetings of the several dairy companies and to the holding of public meetings in the interests of general agriculture. All meetings were well attended and keen interest shown.

This season there were in operation twenty-one creameries manufacturing butter, two factories cheese and butter and thirteen factories making cheese; only a total of thirty-five factories with over six thousand patrons supplying milk or cream.

In May the Stanley Bridge Dairying Company's steam boiler became defective and was replaced by a new one which is giving good satisfaction. This Company also changed their water supply to a new well.

The Dunk River Dairying Company installed a new sewerage system. The Tryon Dairy Company made marked improvements to both inside and out of their factory. The Kensington Dairy Company installed a new 25 H. P. Bruce Stewart & Co. boiler and also a new steam engine.

The Morell Creamery built an extension to their boiler room and installed a new I. Matheson & Co. 30 H. P. boiler. The Hazelbrook Creamery and Gowen Brae Cheese Factory also improved the outside appearance of their factories by repairs, some paint and a liberal coat of whitewash.

The practice to curtailment of expenses in some places was overdone at the expense of keeping buildings and equipment up to a high standard. On October 5th fire partially destroyed the Charlottetown Condensed Milk Company's factory and this company have not as yet arranged to carry on their creamery business.

Regular inspection and instruction work was carried on and in nearly every instance the managers and makers co-operated splendidly and I can assure you, gentlemen, the dairy business is showing steady improvement.

The practice of re-testing milk and cream samples was continued. All complaints were given special attention and the spirit of confidence between patron and maker is improving. All those in charge of making the Babcock Tests are capable men and their work is seldom open to fair criticism.

BUTTER The butter production in our Province was 2,322,180 pounds, an increase over 1931 of 258,828 pounds. Only 151,648 pounds were graded. This was 100 per cent No. 1's with an average score of 92.462, leading all other provinces, the average score for Canada being 90.992. This

In the face of a further decline in activity on the local stock exchange in today's session of trading, value revealed a firmer tendency which may be counted as having reflected a variety of factors including a recovery in wheat; reports of a confidence in London and indications that broad progress was being made in the direction of setting in motion again the financial machinery of the United States. At the close here gains were in excess of losses by 8 to 4, while movements, with but a few exceptions, were confined within narrow limits. B. C. Power proved the feature of trading here, leading in volume and recording a net gain of 2 1/2 points to close at 17 1/2.
