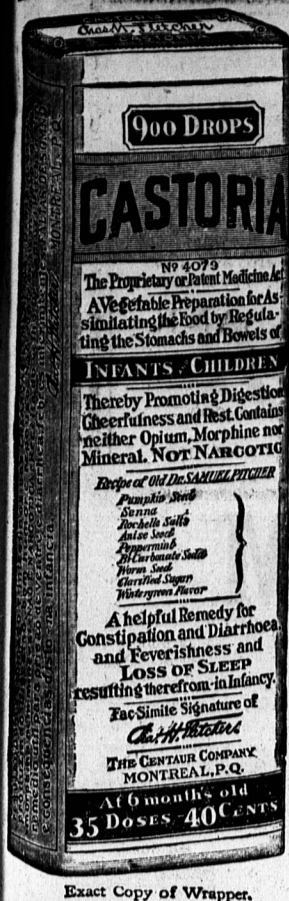

Miss Amy C. Moore who has been visiting her sister Mrs. G. H. Hazard, city left yesterday for return to Halifax.

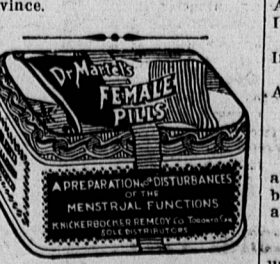
Mr. Guy Cameron Santiago Cuba arrived in Charlottetown yesterday on a short visit to the Island.

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## Presbyterian Missionaries

HALIFAX, July 28.—Rev. R. Gibson Fisher and Mrs. Fisher, who have been on a visit to their native England, sailed from Halifax on July 21st for their field of labor in British Guiana. They have been in the service of the church there for the past sixteen years.

Rev. E. J. O. Fraser and Mrs. Fraser, missionaries home on furlough from Korea for the first time after eight years of hard work there are at present with friends at Fox Blight. It is their intention, after a few months of rest, there to spend the coming winter in Halifax.

Rev. S. A. Fraser and Mrs. Fraser, after nearly twenty-eight years of strenuous and utterly devoted labor in Trinidad, are now enjoying a season of quiet in Beautiful Elmdale.

Rev. W. I. Green, forced by sudden and severe illness to come home some months ago, had so far recovered in the air of his homeland, P. E. Island, that he is about to return to his work in Trinidad.

Rev. H. F. Kemp, who after several years in Trinidad has been taking advantage of one of the post graduate scholarships of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, residence and study in Europe, returning with Mr. Green. They expect to sail for the south by the "Chaudron" of the R. M. S. P. line on August 4.

DRIED FISH USED AS CANDLES.—A fish seems rather an impossible thing to use as a candle or torch; yet it is so used. In British Columbia the Indians catch a beautiful silvery white fish, often a foot in length, which is so full of a rich oil that when dried, it serves well as a candle or torch. It also is good to eat. The Indians call it the "oolichan", or the candlefish. Another queer candle to read by may be found in certain islands of the East Indies. It is made from the fruit of the tallow tree. In Sumatra and elsewhere the natives are very busy around this tree in November, when it loses its leaves, gathering its fruits. The seeds are first boiled and then bruised and heated over the fire, when the vegetable tallow becomes separated. When not quite dry, it looks like coarse lard, but as it hardens it grows beautifully white. Then it is made into cakes and used for the manufacture of candles, that burn with a clear, strong, steady light.

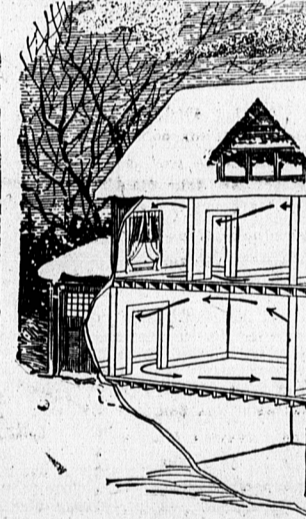
