Sydney Blasts Miners 9-1; Earl Boates In Nets For Glace Bay

GLACE BAY, N.S., March 10.—(CP)—Sydney Mill-naires and Cape Breton Hockey League playoffs all over again tonight and Sydney came through with a 9-1 win in what has now turned into a best-of-three series for the right enter the Maritime semi-final.

Just before game time, the previously started best-of-seven series in which Glace Bay had won three games was used into the second period. Sydney dressed Earl Boates, sub-goalie who had left the team on the eve of the playoffs. Boates' departure had precipitated a hot pasture over Miners' right to controversy over Miners' right to withdraw Bill Fraser from North Sydney Victoria's, ending with Fraser's disqualification after three games.

Earlier tonight, League President A. D. Campbell told Miners they would forfeit those three wins if they tried to use Boates. The Miners, otherwise without a netminder, put Boates between the pipes.

Mill-naires, last year's Maritime champions and leaders of the schedule this winter, quickly went to work piling up a score. They took Boates twice in the opener, and rattled in four more in the second period. Their scoring was topped off with a trio of goals in the last session.

Miners got their only score in the middle period.

George Snell, with four goals and an assist, led the Millionaires to

their scoring spree. Mel Snowden, Bobby Walton, Steve Latoski, Grant Hall and Johnny Atchison notched the others.

Glace Bay's only counter came from the stick of Boots Baird. Playing coach Jo-Jo Graboski, returning to the Miners' line-up after a long layoff from an injury, got credit for the assist.

HALIFAX, March 10.—(CP)—Firing four goals in the opening period, the Royal Canadian Navy team from Halifax coasted tonight to a 6-3 win over Saint John Beavers in the first game of a home-and-home Maritime semi-final hockey series.

The Sailors had to come from behind twice in the first period, but after that session with a 4-3 margin, they added a goal to it in each of the succeeding periods and kept Beavers scoreless for the rest of the game.

With three goals and two assists, Sorrell led the Navy scorers, figuring in all their tallies but one. Balfour got two others, and B. Han-non, formerly with Sydney Millionaires of the Cape Breton Hockey League, wound up the Navy scoring in the last session.

The great Bruin centre added five more points to his total during the week to run it to 55 on 14 goals and a record-breaking assist total of 41. That gave him an 11-point margin over Syl Apps of Toronto, and a 12 and 13-point lead over Bryan Hextall of Detroit respectively.

Cowley, one-time Halifax Wolf-erine, marked up five assists during the period to increase his total-points to 55. Gordie Drillon of Moncton, N.B., took over second place, bagging three goals and three assists for an aggregate of 39, four more than Eddie W'sman of Boston who collected one goal.

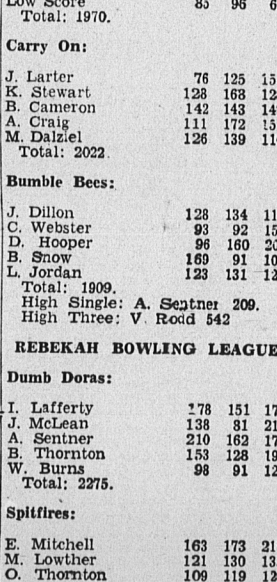

MARITIME MEN AND THEIR SHIPS

THE STORY OF THE "MILTON"

The ship "Milton", out of Mailand, N.S., 1182 tons, was built by Brown and Anthony in 1879 and was commanded by Capt. Henry McArthur.

In August 1881, while in the Pacific, the "Milton's" cargo of Newcastle coal caught fire and the crew abandoned her in three boats, making for Southern California. One boat was lost. Another was picked up after 23 days. But the third, commanded by Capt. McArthur, who was accompanied by his wife and two small sons, went through 46 days under the blazing sun.

One boy died, but the mother and older boy survived the grueling ordeal. McArthur navigated his boat for 2,600 miles and made an almost miraculous landfall, sighting San Roque Island, before they were picked up by a Mexican schooner.
