CARE OF THE INSANE.

We have received the annual report of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum at St. John, a large institution with 547 inmates. There are some matters touched upon in the report of the Superintendent, Dr. George A. Hetherington that it might be well to bring to the notice of the authorities in charge of our own Insane Hospital. Among other things Dr. Hetherington says:

It has been my earnest endeavor to still further increase the attractiveness of the grounds, so as to ensure pleasant, homelike surroundings for the patients. Particular attention has been given to having the walks kept clean and dry. Along these walks seats have been placed in convenient places.

As an additional inducement to outside recreation and exercise—the benefits of which cannot be over-estimated—chair-swings, rope-swings and see-saws have been erected. These, with various games such as croquet, quoits, base ball, etc., are unmistakably appreciated, judging from the cheerful, animated appearance of our grounds during suitable weather.

Many of our patients appeared to derive real pleasure from our greatly increased quantities of flowers, which they have full permission to pluck.

Owing to the large amount of vegetables grown we have been enabled to give a more generous and varied diet than ever before, a provision attended by most satisfactory results.

Among other things noted as tending to the improvement of the patients is a good church choir, which has largely increased the attendance at the Church services. The careful training of the attendants is another matter which received attention. The Superintendent tells that he personally conducts a class. Each nurse and attendant is in possession of the latest and best hand-book on the treatment of the insane. They are examined at regular intervals on different portions of this book, and it is found that without exception they evince the greatest interest in this study. This must tend to greatly increase their efficiency, and at the same time must conduce to the increased comfort and welfare, as well as to the cure of the unfortunate patients.

Among the recommendations made by Superintendent Hetherington is that the name Lunatic Asylum be dropped and that of Provincial Sanitarium adopted in its stead. The reasons given are that the insane are now universally recognized as "sick," calling for our greatest sympathy, our most patient kindness and our most humane and considerate treatment. The old time abuses which surround the name "asylum" with so many odious associations to the public mind arose from barbarously crude conceptions of treatment. Unfortunately such associations linger even in our time of scientific enlightenment. Now the treatment of the insane has become one of the most subtle sciences having for its base and foundation an intense humanity. It is remarked in this connection that among thirty institutions for the insane in the United States only three are called "asylums." The name is however a pretty common one in Canada, although we prefer the term "hospital" as we have it here, or "sanitarium" as suggested by Dr. Hetherington.

In the report before us stress is laid upon giving both employment and recreation to patients. The absence of both employment and recreation was for a long time one of the most serious drawbacks to our Insane Hospital here and this, with the overcrowded condition and the wretched state of the building (now much improved) no doubt greatly hindered the care of patients and rendered its operation very unsatisfactory.

The supplementary estimates brought down on Tuesday at Ottawa make a formidable total of \$3,729,716, of which pretty nearly a million (\$941,273) is to be charged to capital. These are record-breaking years in Canadian expenditures.
