STRATHCONA'S HORSE SAIL Islanders Presented With a Flag Lead the Way AND THEY ALL WORE SHAMROCKS

Grand Preparations for St. Patrick's Day—Bloemfontein is Happy—Free Staters Surrendering—Roberts Promises to Lead His Men to Pretoria—More British Forces Entering the Orange State From the South.

HALIFAX, March 16.—(Special)—The Strathcona Horse and Island Contingent embarked on the steamer Monterey and will sail early to-morrow morning.

The forces paraded the street this afternoon to martial music, and amid great cheering and waving of banners.

THE FEARLESS SIX HUNDRED.

LORENZO MARQUIS, March 16.—(Special) Two Boer Commissioners sailed for Europe on the German Steamer Thotia.

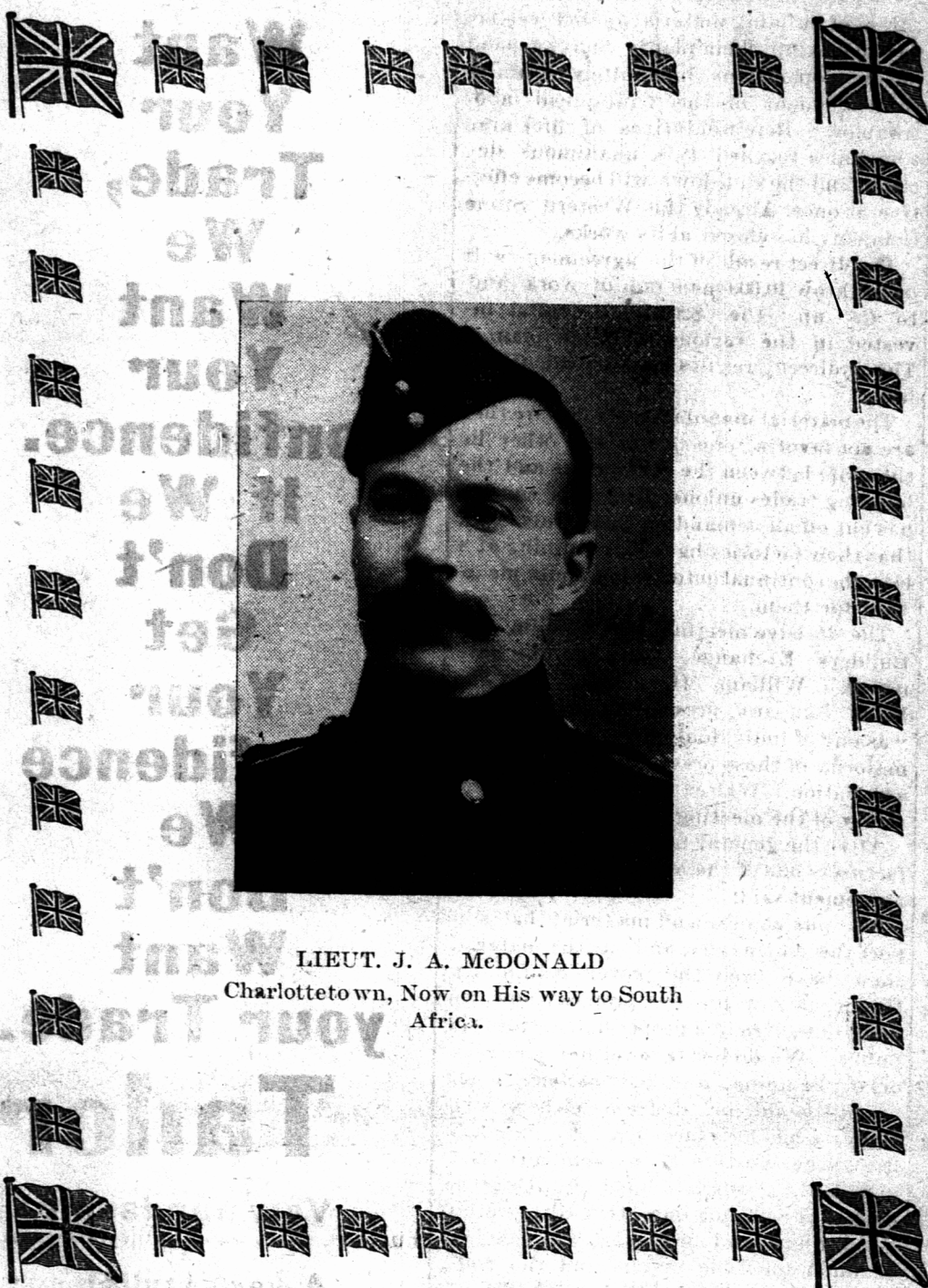
ROBERTS WILL LEAD TO PRETORIA.
