The mail train arrived in this city last evening at ten o'clock.

Rev. D. McLean will preach in St. John's Church, Belfast on Sabbath next, 26th inst., at 11 a.m.

Mrs. H. W. Longworth and Mrs. Longworth, City, were passengers returning by the Northumberland last evening.

Amie Coyle, City, went down yesterday to serve out a six month's sentence for an infraction of the prohibition act.

Mrs. W. M. Flynn and daughter of Cardigan, who have been visiting in the city for the past few days have returned home.

The funeral of the late Thomas Pembroke, City, will leave his sister's residence, 87 Bayfield street, this morning at eleven o'clock for Rustico Cemetery.

The Guardian was advised that one year ago yesterday the thermometer stood at 82 in the shade and on the following day 84, being the warmest registered during that summer.

Owing to the heavy lightning storm last night and the consequential closing of the telephone exchange the temperature report which appears on the first page of each issue could not be obtained from the Meteorological station.

Quite an interesting game of baseball took place Tuesday evening between the Gaytown team and a team from Bayfield Street. It was marked by some pretty nice plays by both sides. The score at the finish was 12 to 5 in favor of Gaytown.

T. A. Peters of the Fruit Division, Ottawa will address a meeting in the orchard of John Gill, York on Thursday, June 23rd, at 10.30 a. m. Friday, June 24th, in the orchard of Geo. Bearsto, Covehead at 10.00 a. m. and Saturday in the orchard of Hugh McMillan Cornwall, at 10.00 a. m. at each of these meetings the Bordeaux mixture will be made up and the Commercial Lime Sulphur and Arsenate of Lead will also be applied. It is very important that Fruit Growers should get all the information they can in regard to orchard-ing.

The police report a girl of tender years found roaming the streets one night recently about eleven o'clock. The girl has a home, or at least enough of one to bear the name of father, but those in charge of it are either indifferent as to the little one's future or are positively negligent in the manner of her early training. Would this not be a case for the Children's Aid Society to look into before the time for doing good is past?

The death occurred at Herring Cove yesterday of Thomas Hayes, one of the best known men in the fisheries of Nova Scotia on the eastern coast. Mr Hayes contracted smallpox last winter, from the effects of which he never fully recovered. The death of his brother Patrick some six weeks ago was a great shock to him, and he has since been gradually breaking down, and coming yesterday in his eighty-first year. He was a great oarsman, rowing his first race as a boy of sixteen. He rowed in a four against St. John more than one occasion. In 1871, he was in the famous Prior crew that rowed in the carnival races at Halifax that year, when they were beaten a length by one of the English crews. This crew won many victories and their record will long be preserved in aquatic annals. He was light-keeper at Herring Cove from the time it was built till after the elections of 1896, when he became a victim of the political axe. The sons are Edward, Patrick and John in Halifax, and Richard of Boston. The daughters are Mrs. Frank Hanrahan, Mrs. Michael Carroll. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock, interment to be in the cemetery at Herring Cove. Up to this time the only break in the Prior crew was in the death of George Brown, which occurred in 1875. The surviving members of the crew are Warren Gray, and James McGrath, now of Prince Edward Island. Charles Nickerson was a spare man in the crew.—Halifax Herald.

The outward cargo by the Northumberland from this port yesterday morning was two cars mixed freight six horses and six head of cattle. There were about twenty-one passengers crossing.

Yesterday morning before the Stipendiary magistrate for Queen's County the case of Hardy vs. Abbott was continued and the argument finished. It was adjourned until Monday for judgment.

By the St. John papers it is learned that the famous singer Madam Melba is to be in St. John in September. The suggestion has been made that the music loving people of this city endeavor to get Madam Melba to appear in Charlottetown.

A very severe lightning and thunder storm passed over this city last evening and reached its heaviest point about ten twenty.
