Charges Connection With Japs In B.C.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14 (CP)—A charge that there was a direct permanent connection in British Columbia between the C. C. F. and Japanese in that Province was made in the Commons Saturday by A. W. Hall, independent member for the Pacific coast Comox-Alberni constituency.

He made the statement during a speech in which he said there were two Japanese in the gallery taking notes, contrary to rules of the House, when Prime Minister Mackenzie King was outlining the government's policy after the war of handling the Japanese in Canada.

Mr. King said that it was "rather absurd" to make a sensation out of a few people being in the gallery taking notes.

He added: "Was there anything they heard or saw that could possibly have helped to, that was not reported in newspapers and that they could not have obtained the next morning in printed form." This War—Four Years Ago

AUGUST 16, 1940 — Admiralty announced Britain had lost 47 naval units to date. Britain and U. S. conferred on acquisition by U. S. of British naval and air bases in western hemisphere. Seventy-five German planes downed in bombing of Thames estuary. Greek government ordered partial mobilization.

RECOMMEND BLOOD TESTING

OTTAWA, Aug. 15 — (C P) — Encouragement of blood testing as a protective measure against syphilis was recommended by delegates attending a national conference last week of venereal disease control officials of the Dominion, provinces and territories.

Certain cities, notably Quebec, Halifax and Prince Rupert, B. C., had reduced venereal disease rates very considerably when strong community action was taken.

PARLIAMENTARY DAMAGE RECORDED IN GUIDE LONDON, Aug. 14 — (C P) — Britain's House of Parliament was damaged by air raids on 12 separate occasions between Sept. 11, 1940, and May 10, 1941, it was disclosed in a revised edition of the official guide to the Palace of Westminster. The guide, which gives particulars of the damage caused, said that on May 10, 1941, a deliberate enemy air attack appeared to have been made on the buildings housing 25 parliament. Twelve incidents were recorded in that one raid, including the destruction by fire of the Commons Chamber. A bomb went through the floor of the House of Lords Chamber without exploding. Primary purpose of the guide is to cater to the large numbers of visitors the war has brought to London.	MOTHER HIDES WAIF DESERTER CARDIFF, Wales — (CP) — More than two years ago a member of the Women's Auxiliary Air Force overstayed her leave and was afraid to go back to face the consequences. She had no ration books, no clothes coupons, but during all that time her mother fed her, clothed her and hid her. The facts were revealed when Mrs. Mary Rees, a widow, was bound over for assisting in concealing an absentee. An R.A.F. officer told the court that had the girl gone back to camp the worst that could have happened to her was 14 days' confinement to camp and loss of pay. 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NOTICE TO FARMERS

The National Selective Service, Ottawa, in conjunction with Military Authorities have made it possible for the Dominion-Provincial Farm Labour Bureau to offer the services of 150 English speaking members of a Nova Scotia Unit to the farmers of this Province under the Detailed Farm Duty Plan. Under this plan such soldiers work under strict Military Rule; Officers and N. C. O. accompany them to the Province. The rate of pay is \$3.00 per day, wet days and Sundays excluded.

As haying has dove tailed into harvesting and harvesting will be immediately followed by potato digging and the root crop: it would be well for farmers needing additional help to immediately take advantage of this offer. The majority of the men available are hardy and experienced labourers, coming from the Maritimes, but if any prove unsatisfactory you are not compelled to retain their services.
