SCIENTIFIC IMMORTALITY

We have received from the publishers, The National Magazine Association of Omaha, Neb., a book entitled Immortality Established Through Science, by John O. Yeiser. The book is now in its second edition, the first edition having been exhausted in a few weeks.

The purpose of the book is to prove the possibility and the probability of immortality, or, in the words of the author, "to present an impartial and simple synthetic theory of the metaphysical existence of man after death, based upon scientific facts."

Following the usual arguments of the evolutionist, tracing man and other animals from their common origin away back in the misty and nebulous ages, the author is satisfied that our progress was made more by mental push and physical exertion directed by desire than by the mere circumstance of accident. These directing accidents cause the lowest animals to think and change their desires.

It required persistent thought, faith, desire and practice of man's ancestors for thousands of generations, studying shadows on the more sensitive pigment cells to produce the eye. We may think ourselves up or down. By thought and persistent practice we may evolve higher or degenerate lower. By distaste and mental and physical abandonment we have shortened the appendage to the spinal column and changed the shape of the foot, while other forms of life, have changed their eyes in the sockets, so say the evolutionists.

"If some of us," argues the author "are satisfied to remain physical matter and go through life suggesting to ourselves that when certain physical calamities occur we shall die and mentally lose consciousness and cease to exist, it is reasonable to believe that we may obey the suggestion and either become absolutely exterminated by being separated and reduced to primary elements or in state of coma if permitted to continue as an entity. Some may stop to mark the progress of nature and remain men with mere rudimentary souls.

The author argues that if an eye has been produced from a cell or pigment of matter by evolution, we may conclude that by the same process a soul may have been produced from a spark of intelligence, mind or life. This assumption does not rest upon a belief in the existence of God, but simply upon the ignorant obedience of laws that are divine. Man had come up from a stage of life which was too low to recognize the existence of a God, but nevertheless he came in obedience to His laws struggling and desiring for something higher until the final dependence of this energy stand in the perfection of manhood of today, manhood with a soul.

According to this theory the soul, which was separated as a mere sprout, has for ages been evolving from an unconscious, potential experience to a conscious immortality, not entirely unlike a very low order of immortality of matter.

The author is a lawyer and has taken up the study of science evidently as a side line. His book is well written and gives very much that is interesting and some that is new in connection with the theory of evolution. It will be seen however that in his theory of the evolution of a soul from the weak and original spark of intelligence with which man, while occupying the lower stages of life, became a thinking being, there is a weakness that will leave a large section of the human race minus a soul. At what stage in the evolution of intelligence did the desire for immortality become sufficiently strong to produce a soul? Until this question is satisfactorily answered it will be feared that a large proportion of the human race must have passed out of life as their ancestors in the Archeozoic and Palaeozoic ages did without souls.

THE EGG TRADE

It was reported in the Guardian that the Charlottetown merchants had resolved to pay no more than 30c. per dozen for fresh eggs. Their contention is that their customers grumble at the present high price and that the risk thereon is now greater than the profit they make from handling the article. It is not likely this united stand on the part of the merchants will have much effect on the egg market as we believe as high as 40c. per dozen is being paid for selected eggs by the representatives of the cold storage companies at the farmer's door so there is practically no loss to them on freight or transportation.

The Department of Agriculture at Ottawa has just issued an interesting circular on the subject of egg consumption from which we gather that Canadians are large consumers of eggs, and the consumption per capita is steadily increasing. In 1891 the average per capita was 11.8 in 1901, 13.72; in 1911, 17.39, the increase in the latter decennial being about four dozen per head. This increase, we are told, is not by any means confined to the cities. Farmers generally are eating more eggs than ever before. In many rural districts it is practically impossible to secure fresh meats at certain seasons, and as at such times eggs are usually plentiful they are used freely.

In this connection it is interesting to quote from an address by W. W. A. Brown, B.S.A. at Ontario Winter Fair on 8th inst.

"It should not be overlooked," said Mr. Brown, "before dwelling on the great opportunity that exists for the Canadian producer at the present time, that Canadian eggs are not marketed at the period of high quality that one would expect.

"From information in the possession of the Live Stock Branch, it is estimated that in the summer time not over 33 per cent. of the eggs received in the large markets grade 'select.' About 40 per cent. grade 'stale,' approximately 17 per cent. 'very stale,' 5 per cent. 'dirty' and 'broken,' and 5 per cent. 'bad'. Some dealers state that as high as 10 to 12 per cent. of their receipts prove, upon examination, to be wholly unfit for food. This latter is a feature that those who criticize the present high prices do not seem to have taken into consideration.

"In conclusion, it is evident that the most salient feature of the whole question is the golden opportunity for the farmers and others to increase their poultry plants and take advantage of the high prices prevailing for poultry and poultry products. Every farmer should keep at least one hundred hens. The amount of labor entailed is not great, and with reasonable success the revenue obtainable therefrom, in proportion to capital invested, is greater and more readily available than from any other branch of farm work."

TWO MILLION DOLLAR COMPANY.—A telegram was received yesterday that the Eastern Canada Fox Farming Co., Ltd., had been duly registered under the Nova Scotia law in Halifax. This company has a capital of \$2,000,000 divided into two hundred thousand 7 per cent. preferred shares of \$5 each and two hundred thousand common or ordinary shares of \$5 each. The directors are the Lieut.-Governor, His Honor Benjamin Rogers, President; Major A. A. Bartlett, Secretary; Treasurer; Dr. James Warburton, Mr. E. R. Brow and Mr. David Schurman. The company is formed for the purpose of acquiring and merging under one management several ranches on the Island. The shares are to be placed on the English market, and representatives of the company will leave for England almost immediately to effect flotation there.

REV. R. H. STAVERT.—On Tuesday evening last a large and enthusiastic temperance meeting was held in Bloomfield, says a St. John eccl. change. Mr. Isaac Ward presided. The lecturer of the evening was Rev. R. H. Stavert, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance for New Brunswick. On Monday evening a meeting was held at Bairdville. A local branch of the Alliance was formed. On Sunday Mr. Stavert addressed meetings at the following places—Aroostook Junction, 11 a. m.; Perth, 3 p. m.; Andover, 7.30 p. m., and a mass meeting in Perth at 8.30 p. m.—Rev. R. H. Stavert was formerly of this Province.
