Macken Scores Upset By Winning Opening Match In Davis Cup Competition

MONTREAL, July 21 (CP) — Big Brendan Macken of Montreal defeated Canada's victory-drought against Australia in Davis Cup tennis competition today, scoring an upset triumph over smiling Billy Sidwell in an opening round singles match of the North American zone.

The 26-year-old Canadian gave a masterful demonstration of court finesse in overpowering Sidwell, 6-4, 7-5, 6-3, 5-7, 8-6 in a three-hour-long match.

The victory gave Canada a 1-0 lead in the five-match series, but Australia's Frank Sedgman quickly evened it up by taking the measure of Henri Rochon of Montreal in straight sets, 6-4, 6-2, 6-2. Sedgman.

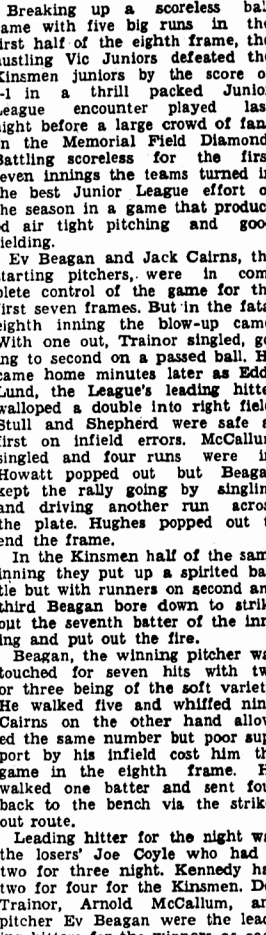

WON ON MERITS

Both finalists, less favored in the draw, won on their merits as the 36-hole championship final which will be played today over the Belvedere course of the Charlottetown Golf Club.

A large turnout of fans is expected to view the final of the Maritime Ladies' Golf Championship at the Charlottetown Golf Club today.

Tournament officials announced yesterday that the general public was cordially invited to attend and follow the play, which gets underway this morning at 9:30 a.m.

Given a fighting chance to win after a sparkling performance Wednesday, Mrs. Cotton, three times club champion and once Provincial champion, got away to a shaky start as her opponent went two up on the first two holes. Steadying from that point on, the winner cut her opponent's lead in half by shooting the third hole in par and after halving the fourth squared the match on the fifth.

Gaining confidence the Charlottetown shotsmith took the lead on the sixth. The match was squared again as Miss Wilson won the seventh, but with the eighth hole halved, Mrs. Cotton began to up at the halfway mark with a win on the ninth.

AGAIN TAKES LEAD

Miss Wilson got away to a flying start on the incoming nine, winning the tenth, twelfth and thirteenth holes after the eleventh had been halved and regaining her original two hole lead. Mrs. Cotton, however, performed steadily. Sending booming drives away from the tee, approaching and putting consistently she won the fourteenth, the next two holes were halved, but the Charlottetown woman squared matters on the seventeenth to set the stage for the tense struggle that was to follow.

Each putted out in par on the eighteenth; both were one over on the nineteenth; they came back to shoot par golf on the twentieth with the match ending dramatically on the twenty-first green as Mrs. Cotton sank a par four after Miss Wilson's brilliant effort on a long putt from the back of the green rimmed the cup and stayed out. Mrs. Cotton's last shot, inches away from the cup, after a spectacular attempt at a long putt, was conceded.

The tense gallery generously applauded both players at the close of the gruelling performance.

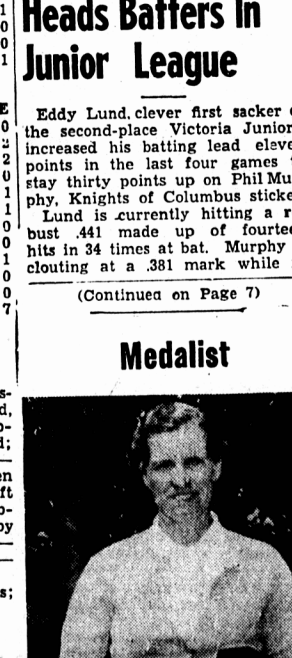
