Hunter River Club

The ninth annual meeting of the Hunter River Live Stock Shipping Club was held in the hall at New Glasgow on February 16th, 1933, with the President, Granville Buntain in the chair. After giving a short review of the year's work, the president called upon the secretary for a report on the business transacted during the year, which report showed that in all 40 shipments of live stock had been made, totalling 1168 head, and valued at \$9,019.49. This was an increase of 130 head over the previous year. The hogs graded 40% Selects, and sold at an average price of 3.91¢ per cwt. The club also shipped over 700 young pigs, and quite a number of lambs and calves to Newfoundland at satisfactory prices. The following officers and directors were elected for the coming year:

President—Granville Buntain.

Vice-president—Percy Dickieson.

Secretary—Russell Nicholson.

Directors—Cecil Laird, C. A. Doucette, Walter Buntain, Lorne Houston, Ernest Houston, J. F. Moffatt.

The meeting was then addressed by Mr. S. D. Irvine, Federal Sheep & Swine Promoter, upon various subjects pertaining to Branch activities in the province, and included references to Advanced Registry of pure bred swine, co-operative marketing and other topics. During Mr. Irvine's address he intimated that he had recently spent some time in the province of Ontario and that farmers there, located within 60 miles of Toronto and Montreal were selling their hogs at a net price with which our net returns here compared very favorably indeed. This showed what co-operative marketing was doing for our farmers, and why every hog producer should stand solidly for the support of his local club.

The farmers present took an active part in the discussion which followed and agreed that if all farmers in the district would stick by their club, instead of dividing the weekly volume moving between drover and club, and placing their output on the same limited markets the one group in competition with the other, it would be better for all concerned, and a more staple market could be maintained. Farmers, at the present time, cannot afford to market their live stock production in a haphazard way, by dickering as independent groups that invariably lose out on their misguided efforts to gain a small advantage over their neighbours. So come along, boys, give us your support for 1933, and help us to give you better returns for your live stock.

FORMER ISLANDER VIVIDLY DESCRIBES QUAKE EXPERIENCES

Reassuring Letter Received From Mr. Gordon Dawson, Formerly Of Augustine Cove, Now Residing At Hollywood California.

A vivid account of the recent earthquake disturbance in California was received this week from Mr. Gordon Dawson, son of Mr. Edwin Dawson, clerk of the Legislative Assembly, and Mrs. Dawson Augustine Cove. Writing to his mother from Hollywood on March 10, Mr. Dawson says in part:

"No doubt you will be reading of the earthquake that has wrecked many communities in Southern California tonight and be wondering how we came through. We are all O.K. though naturally nervous after the experience we have had tonight. All telegraph and telephone lines are out of commission but according to the radio reports coming in, Long Beach is badly wrecked and the people in panic. With the city on fire.

"The State Militia is in charge in Long Beach and Coast cities where martial law has been declared. A radiogram sent to sea brought the fleet rushing to Long Beach where thousands of marines disembarked for patrol duty.

"Another terrific shock has just shook the house here, heaving and throwing it like a paper in the wind, and a warning has just come over the radio for people who are returning to their homes to stay near the entrance and leave the doors open.

"Poor little Edwin awakened screaming from his sleep and says: 'Bad old noise scares me, Daddy.' 'Believe me, when the first shock came at five minutes to six we were all scared. I had just come out of the office and was walking over to the corner to get the evening paper when the sidewalk and street began rocking and swaying and for a minute I wondered what was wrong with me, when suddenly a woman in front of me fainted and fell to the sidewalk and I noticed the tall Security National Bank building swaying back and forth from east to west, and almost was thrown down myself when I realized I was experiencing my first real earthquake. It lasted about a minute and as soon as it ceased I rushed for my car and drove home. Everyone was out in the street and naturally very excited.

Mr. Dawson then describes his arrival home, where he found his family safe, but naturally very much alarmed. He continues: "We have had twelve shocks since 6 p. m., and right now we are having another slight one with windows rattling and lights swaying... If anything serious happens again tonight will add a note to this before mailing it tomorrow."

The following postscripts were added to the letter: "1 a. m. Slight shock. House trembling. "1.09 a. m. Heavier shock. House shaking and trembling violently; dishes rattling and lights went off for a moment. "2.30 a. m. Slight shock, but clearly noticeable. "2.45 a. m. Slight shock. Lamps

swaying and lights swaying in the street. "6.05 a.m. Slight shock. Calls still coming in for help for Long Beach. "Great excitement this morning but the tremors have ceased." Mr. Dawson has been residing for two years at Hollywood. He had previously taught school for several years in Saskatchewan after his graduation from Prince of Wales College. Many friends, as well as relatives here will be pleased to learn that he and his family have come safely through such harrowing experiences.
