**McKIM'S DIRECTORY SHOWS  
MANY CHANGES IN  
PUBLISHING FIELD**

The Canadian Newspaper Directory  
for 1919 just issued by the publishers,  
A. McKim, Limited, Advertising Ag-  
ency, of Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg  
and London, England, indicates great  
activity in the publishing field during  
the past year.

While the number of daily papers  
published in 1918 diminished from  
135 to 126—due mainly to the effect  
of the high cost of newspaper, the to-  
tal number of Canadian publications  
increased from 1,490 to 1,552. Fifty  
five new weeklies have arisen during  
the past year.

Altogether, the situation warrants  
optimism of the soundest nature, re-  
flecting, as it does, the healthy condi-  
tion prevailing generally from East  
to West of the Dominion.

Whoever examines the pages of the  
McKim Directory with the care they  
deserve cannot fail to be impressed  
with the great labor involved in glean-  
ing so many thousands of items of  
information. Not only is the entire  
field of Canadian publications cov-  
ered, but the Directory is a complete  
gazetteer of every town and city in  
Canada and Newfoundland where a  
publication is issued. One may turn  
to it for information as to population,  
county seats, railways and waterways,  
telegraph, express and banking facili-  
ties.

Especially with the new conditions  
arising daily—Reconstruction, expan-  
sion, development—this book in its  
familiar green and red covers must

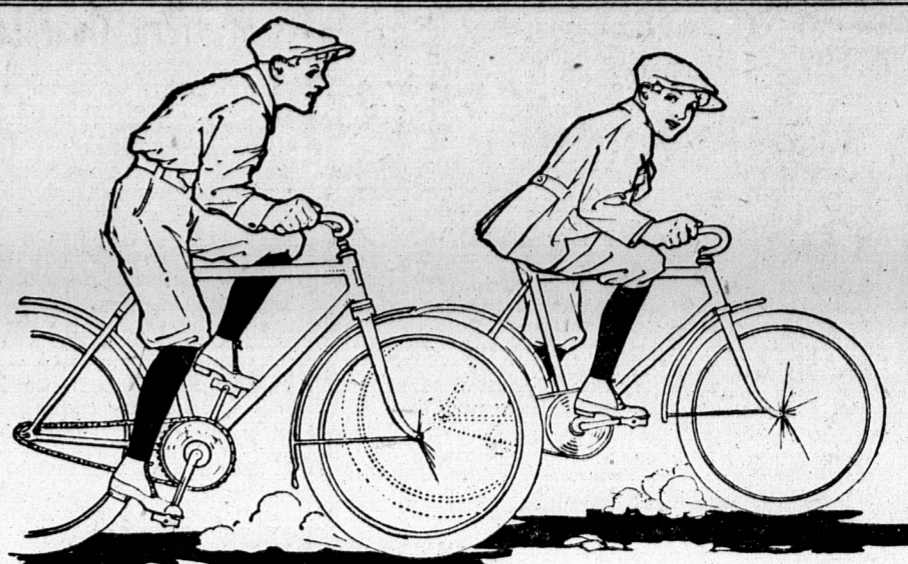

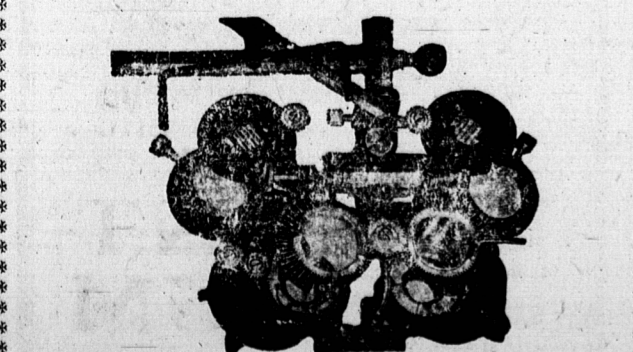

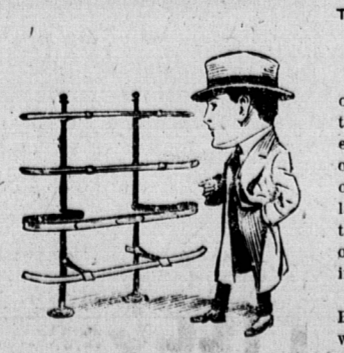
