THE TARIFF CHANGES.

The first brief announcement by telegraph of the changes made in the tariff accentuated the reduction of the oil duties by one half and the placing of molasses from the British West Indies on the free list. These are welcome changes for this latitude and it was right that we should be informed thereof without delay. There are some few articles placed on the free list, classes in which most of our people are not greatly interested-goats for the improvement of stock, whale oil soap, artificial teeth, quassa juice, gold mining machinery, brass-making machinery and so forth. But the more noteworthy changes apart from those in regard to oil and molasses are distinctly in the line of higher protection.

One noteworthy instance is the additional 6 per cent protection given to Canadian woolen manufacturers by raising the present 23 per cent preferential duties to 30 per cent on tweeds, coatings, and overcoatings and other woolen goods (except blankets, bed comforters and counterpanes.) Another instance is that open carriages are henceforth to be valued at not less than \$40 and covered ones at not less than \$50. Then there is the protection against "dumping." This provision is that when it is proven that any article is being sold in Canada at less than the fair market price in the country of its origin a special duty shall be imposed not exceeding 10 per cent on the value. There are various opinions in regard to this although the provision is generally received with favor. There is some doubt expressed as to the plan being workable, but if it can be carried out it will probably impose an effectual check upon the practice complained of. It is, however, an advanced protectionist measure.

Mr. Fielding also holds out the prospect

that a committee of experts will be called together before making a general tariff revision. This is well pleasing to the manufacturers. It reads something like the general invitation, "If you don't see what you want, ask for it." The protected interests in Canada must be well satisfied on view of the minor changes now made and the general tone of Mr. Fielding's budget speech that they have really nothing to fear in the future from the party in power. This attitude of the Government is, to say the least a politic one, in view of the strong agitation for increased protection. It must lessen the force of the Opposition attack and the matter of consistency is not now a dominant issue. No one will be foolish enough to attempt to reconcile the Liberal tariff of 1897 and since with the Liberal platform of 1893.

Hon. James H. Cammiskey and family will have the sympathy of a wide circle of friends in the next Government.

The military article of the Toronto Globe looks for the bombardment and capture of Port Arthur "a week or ten days" from the 9th. It would be safe to add a week or ten day more, perhaps several weeks. The Guardian has not expected the capture before the beginning of July in any case.

Major General O'Grady Haley, who was the one British commander of the Canadian militia who filled the full term of his appointment, said: "The present arrangement by which the chief command in some of our large self-governing colonies is always in the hands of a British officer cannot be perpetuated." It looks as though he was right.

Speaking of eligible candidates for the Lieutenant Governorship, where is there another who has as many qualifications for the position as Hon. David Laird? A Liberal of the Liberals, who has served long and ably on the platform and in the press, in the provincial and federal Parliaments and in the federal Cabinet, who has moreover had experience, as a Governor over half the area of Canada, and whose stature is like Saul's, "higher than any of the people from the shoulders upward." The Guardian bespeaks a fair consideration for the claims of the Tall Chief in this matter.

John H. Campbell of Harrison Avenue, Boston, writes The Guardian expressing the hope that the United Kingdom will not adopt conscription as recommended by the Commission on volunteers and militia. It has been already stated in these columns that the British Government has stated that there is no intention to adopt the plan of conscription, so that there is not much use in arguing the case. Mr. Campbell thinks that Britain, Canada and the United States should disarm in the interests of peace and so set a Christian example to the nations worthy of the twentieth century. We have not adopted conscription in Canada, but under our present Militia Act the Government has power in an emergency to compel every able bodied man, with a few exceptions, to take up arms for the defence of the country.
