THE BRITISH LABOR PARTY.

The Laborites as they are called, representatives of the labor organizations in the new Parliament of the United Kingdom, have increased their numbers from ten in the last House about five fold. At the end of 1903 there were 1160 trades unions with a membership of 1,902,908, a number equal to one third of the voters in England and Wales. These numbers have since been considerably increased.

It becomes of interest to know what the Labor Platform is in politics. It includes the following demands:

- Restriction of the hours of labor to eight a day for miners and for work-people generally; amendment of the law in relation to trade unions and industrial disputes; amendment of the Mines Regulation Act, the Factory and Workshops Acts, the Shop Clubs Act, the Workmen's Compensation Acts and the Truck Acts; the wages and general conditions of labor of government employees; general old age pensions; abolition of the character-note system; improving housing accommodation for working people; municipal trading and banking; uniform compulsory hours of closing for shops; special courts for trial of claims for wages due, etc.; measures to prevent the dismissal of workmen for being members of trade unions; use of trade union labels on manufactured goods; nationalization of mines, railways and canals; and abolition of the privilege cab system at railway stations.

King Edward includes among his subjects nearly 400,000,000 persons great and small and London Tit Bits tells that there is not a single one of all this vast number in prison or under restraint for treason or disloyalty.

We print in another column the appeal of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, S. of T. Rev. A. D. McDonald, to the electors of Prince County giving reasons why they should vote "Against the Act" on Thursday next, thus repealing the Scott Act and bringing Prohibition into force. We confidently expect they will do this.

Hon. John Costigan in an interview with the Ottawa Free Press expresses his strong conviction that the Liberal victory in the United Kingdom will result in Home Rule for Ireland. The grounds on which he bases this conclusion are that the Liberal Premier is committed to Home rule in some form, and that the Irish Nationalists and the Laborites have an alliance for mutual support which is too strong to be disregarded.

The death of the aged King Christian IX of Denmark is announced. He was born in April 1818, and had nearly completed his 88th year. The deceased King was father of Queen Alexandra, the dowager Empress of Russia, and the reigning King of Greece. King Christian succeeded to the throne in November, 1893. He was a sovereign of high character, fair ability and much beloved by his people. He will be succeeded by the Crown Prince Frederick, born in 1843.

We heartily endorse the following extract from a leading article in The Patriot of yesterday:

"In this city we have had license laws, we have had the Scott Act, and now we have had the Prohibition Law quite long enough in operation to be able to judge between the relative merits of the several laws, and the people of Prince County can be confidently assured that the Prohibition Act is away ahead of the others; and that it is now classed with the Water Works and Sewerage systems, as things that our city would not now think of doing without."

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.

Sir,—In last Wednesday's issue of The Patriot, a statement was made to the effect, that at the session of the G. D. held at O'Leary, the G. W. P. Bro. McDonald had the following questions put to him, viz:

"Is it competent for a D. G. W. P. to install the officers of his Division without being requested to do so by the G. W. P.?" His answer was, "I do not think so" and then gives his reason for arriving at that conclusion.

Hitherto I have taken no notice of statements issued through the same organ about this matter, but as it is now attempted to exhume a dead issue, and statements again reiterated void of truth, silence becomes no longer golden. The whole case was contained in an appeal by Victoria Division to the National Division—against the action of the Grand Division of P. E. I. on certain charges made against their chief officer.

This body met last July in New Jersey, U. S. Their Committee on Appeals made a report on this case which was adopted. Their report which was very brief ends with the following:

"Your Committee recommend that the action of the G. D. of P. E. Island, and the decision of M. W. Patriarch Williams be sustained." On motion this report was adopted which virtually ended the whole matter.

The decision of the G. D. agreed to was with'n their rights. That of Most Worthy Patriarch Williams, dealing with the constitutional rights of the G. W. P. and his Deputy is a most crushing rebuke to the ideas entertained by some of the dignity of office and covers all that is contained in the questions asked G. W. P. McDonald, besides sustaining Victoria Division, in their appeal on the main question, which originated the whole trouble. The language used in reference to the relative powers of the G. W. P. and his Deputy, on the main point at issue reads as follows:

"A Deputy would certainly be acting within his commission by installing the officers of the Division over which he had been appointed, even though the G. W. P. were present, and it would make no difference whether the G. W. P. were there officially or as a visitor, or unofficially. I know the ceremony in the B. B. calls for the G. W. P. and G. C. to perform it, yet when the G. W. P. issues the commission to the Deputy, he delegates to that Deputy the rights conferred on the G. W. P. in said B. B. and nothing short of a revocation of that commission or an invitation on the part of the Deputy to perform the ceremony would allow the G. W. P. to do it. Of course this would apply only in the Division which was under the immediate control of a Deputy appointed for that Division."

The above shows that the decision attributed to the G. W. P. is not worth the paper on which it is written. The animus which introduced the "appeal" at O'Leary received a rebuke which not only marks the progress of truth but also of Love, Purity and Fidelity.
