INSURANCE AND TRADE.—How fire insurance protects trade is well illustrated by the notice given by Armour & Co. to the city authorities. St. John's City, the largest better fire protection is afforded the firm will not rebuild the premises burnt some weeks ago as the insurance companies will not issue policies on the buildings and plant under present conditions. At the conclusion of the cases the Magistrate addressed the Court. He recommended that no third offences be proceeded with till the Doherty case, to come before the Supreme Court on certiorari be disposed of, and also stated that he will recommend the Attorney General to amend the law as to provide for appeal and also to make the buyer equally culpable with the seller.
