Why Is Cod Liver Oil Good?

Cod-liver oil is not a popular prescription. Most people take it only under protest, and find it difficult to understand why it should be better for them than cream or butter.

Why should the oil from the liver of a cod have any special merits and be better than the fat in the milk of a cow? The answer to this is that it is not merely the fat in the cod-liver oil which is valuable, but also the vitamins it contains. Scientists have discovered that green food is an important source

of vitamins, and that cows in winter or in times of drought, when green food is lacking, give milk deficient in these essential substances. But cod liver lacks green food in the sea, and those around Norway have particularly rich green pasturage, so that cod liver oil always contains an abundance of vitamins, even more than cream. It is this which makes cod-liver oil such a valuable food.
