Federation Of Agriculture News

Marketing

At the present time the marketing situation is so serious and confusing that it's difficult to say any more than has already been said. We cannot understand why those responsible for controls and restrictions during the war are not taking some action now to maintain farm prices at a fair level until such time as farmers can get organized to protect their own interests.

Maritime Meeting

Representatives of the farm organizations of the four provinces are meeting today in Moncton. At this meeting resolutions will be revamped and the Maritime Presentation prepared for the Canadian Federation annual meeting next week.

Annual Meetings

Reports from those attending the annual meetings of the Dairy-men's Association and the Federation this year were good. Farmers definitely are developing a new outlook on this problem of organization. And a greater spirit of co-operation was noticeable at the meetings which were attended by a very representative group of farmers from all parts of the Island.

Organizing Progress

In spite of poor travelling and weather conditions there is lots of action and arrangements for school district meetings, and membership support for the Federation is progressing well in Prince and Queens Counties.

The date for commencing the Agricultural short course at the Vocational Training School has been changed to January 31st. This is a six weeks course and has been unanimously approved by the Federation. We suggest that any one who can get away should attend this course.
