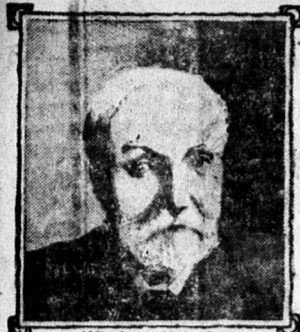

NEW ANNAN.—The annual meeting of this Branch was held at the home of Mrs. Emmeline McKay on April 15th.

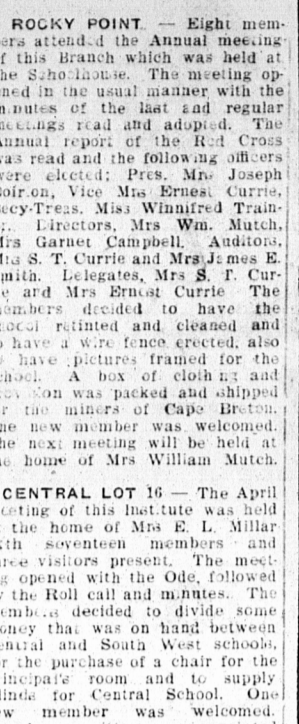
ARMADALE.—The annual meeting of this Branch was held at the home of Mrs. Alphonse McPhee at which six members and four visitors were present.
