DOMINION FINANCES.

Booming trade, big harvests and a full treasury ought not to close the eyes of the Canadian people to the enormous increase in the public expenditure, the new liabilities incurred, and the fact that nearly one half the national debt will fall due within the next seven years and must be provided for by new borrowings.

The baldest outline of these facts must give all thoughtful persons some measure of concern.

In the last year under Conservative rule, 1895-6 the ordinary expenditure of Canada was \$36,940,000 and the total expenditure including capital \$44,066,000. Contrast this with the ordinary expenditure for 1904-5 which was \$63,319,000 and the total expenditure including capital, which ran up to \$78,804,000. In the latter year, notwithstanding the very large revenue over five millions were added to the public debt.

Now let us see what is to be provided for in the near future, in the way of financing the national debt. The following loans are falling due at the dates named:

Nearly 135 millions falling due within the next four years and over 143 millions within seven years to come. To meet this there are available sinking funds to the amount of 47 millions, leaving nearly a round hundred millions that must be borrowed, unless a portion of it is in the meantime made good out of surplus revenues. Of this we can see no prospect, as during the past years the national expenditure has grown much more rapidly than the receipts.

But we must also bear in mind that the Government has undertaken to build the eastern division of the Transcontinental Railway from Moncton to Winnipeg, the cost of which can hardly fall below fifty millions and will probably far exceed that sum. It is hoped to have this road completed by 1911 and in the meantime the money must be got, within the time that the very heavy obligations above referred to are maturing. Fifty millions added to 143 millions makes 193 millions to be provided in one way or another.

Now many things may happen within seven years. Crops may fail, revenues may fall off, a European war may cause an advance in the rate of interest or exhaust the money market. We hope that none of these things may happen, but experience teaches that good times are not perpetual, and peace is by no means assured. It is under circumstances such as these that prudent men counsel caution. Those at the head of affairs are risking the ship of state, with all sail spread, when the financial outlook gives reason to fear heavy financial perturbations within the near future.

THEY WILL KEEP THE GRAB.

Both the Premier and the Leader of the Opposition at Ottawa touched lightly on the salary grab in the debate on the address, but what they said may be taken to mean that the Senators and Members will keep their questionable gains. Mr. Borden justifies the increase. Sir Wilfrid says that possibly some changes might be made with advantage. So there we are. In the meantime the sessions which were first lengthened out beyond all reason to afford a pretext for the grab, are to be suddenly shortened to three months.

Not that the work of the session cannot be done in three months, for it may be, well enough. But to earn \$2,500 in three months—the price of a farm in seventy-five working days, or over \$33 a day—we fear will tax our representatives over much. They will need to be well fed and well groomed to stand the strain. And there is to be another session in November, and another farm. One farm last year, two farms this year. This reminds one of Mr. Tarte's famous words, "Wait till you see us next year!"

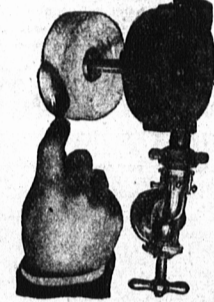
