The S. S. Bonafista sails from Montreal Sunday morning Nov. 20th for Charlottetown direct. She will be due here Tuesday morning Nov. 22nd and sails for St. John's, Newfoundland, via Sydney, C. B. This will be the last sailing of the Black Diamond line steamers from Montreal for this port this season.

THERE was a small attendance at the market yesterday. Poultry was plentiful, geese being from 84-90 per lb and chickens 40-40c a pair. Eggs were scarce and sold at 24-25c per doz. Butter brought from 22-24c. The price of pork was a shade lower being quoted from 11 1/2c. Prices of other products remained unchanged.
