As far as the financial depression is concerned, Mr. Porter and Mr. McKay are convinced that the end has come.

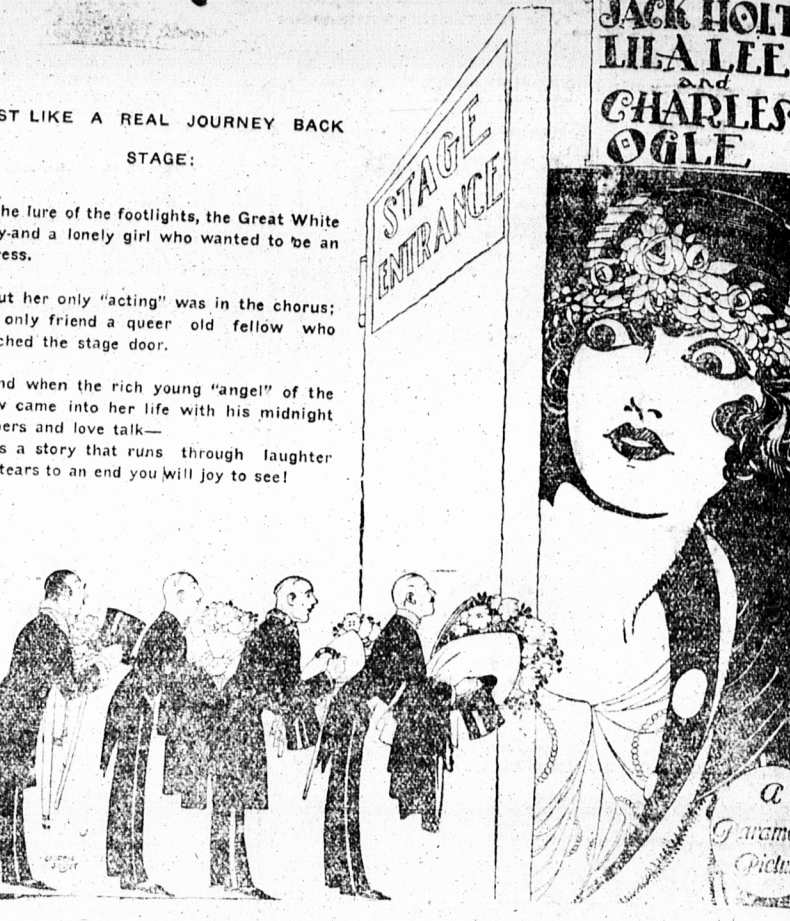

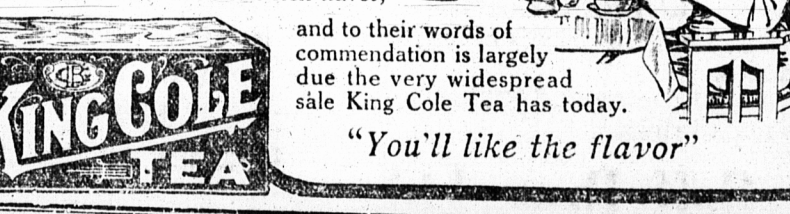

usually exhausted it. The Liberal party, when they assumed power had before them four distinct ideas again renewed. They were determined to grant better salaries to the teachers, to fill vacant schools, to set aside the feeling of rebellion that existed among the teachers and to place the educational question on a sound basis. This ideal, factually carried out, has been 50 per cent increase had been given the teachers; all the schools of the province are now supplied with efficient teachers who are satisfied with the age they are getting; the threatened strike had been averted and teachers' training at Prince of Wales College has been emphasized along scientific lines. This was evidence, the speaker claimed, that the Liberal party was successful in regard to the first element of its policy and it should get a great deal of credit for this in consideration of the existing difficulties. The government when it raised the taxes knew to danger but the members simply did it because it was necessary to carry out their duty. Sir Louis Davies, when he established the school system here laid down the statement that every child had an equal right to education and it was on that principle that he remained to impose a tax. In 1919 the late government introduced a measure for the purpose of increasing the teachers' salaries pretty much to where they are raised at the present time. But there was a rider to the measure to the effect that the Act should not go into effect unless the people approve of it. The people turned it down. If then the Conservatives had come back to power their hands would have been tied by this vote and no increase could have been given the teachers. The question for the Liberal party was how was this popular vote to be treated. On examination of the 1919 act certain radical defects were revealed which justified the people in turning it down, so that the people could not be said to be opposed to the increase in teachers' salaries.

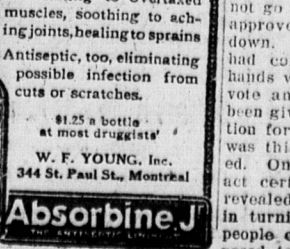
