Councillor T. D. Morrison was re-elected by acclamation yesterday for his seventh consecutive two-year term as councillor for Summerside's Centre Ward. Yesterday was nomination day for the civic election which will take place on next Tuesday and with the exception of this ward there will be contests in every department.

Nominations for the mayoralty are: Councillor Henry Wedge and Mr. Donald Baker. For councillor in the East Ward the contest is between Councillor J. Lloyd Gorrill and Mr. Willard Muttart.

Three candidates will fight it out for the West Ward seat. Messrs. Clarence Steele and Leo Wood both of whom had previously announced their candidacy, and Mr. H. T. Holman, Jr., a member of the firm of R. T. Holman, Ltd. and manager of the grocery department of the store.

There are two candidates for the one seat open on the Water and Sewerage Commission, Messrs. R. B. Hooper and Glorice Gallant, the latter a C.N.R. employee.

Mr. Elmer Newson, who had announced that he would run, changed his mind at the last minute and did not nominate.

Kinsmen Hear Address On Health Week - It being National Health Week, the guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Kinsmen Club of Summerside last evening in the Olympia was Dr. A. R. Grant. In his opening remarks he congratulated the club on its fine record of service to youth and education in the Town and went on to say that the health of a nation is the superstructure on which its economic and social assets depend.

He said that there have been more advances in the field of medicine in the past 15 years than in the previous three centuries. He gave illustrations of how lives are now being saved by the use of new drugs and new scientific and laboratory methods but, he said, these treatments are usually very expensive and often cost more than the patient or his family can afford.

While this presented a problem, he was emphatic that socialized medicine as in force in England today is not the answer. He claimed that medicine is in a chaotic state in that country today. Dr. Grant admitted that some form of staff assistance or health insurance is coming in Canada and said that it depends on the people what kind we get.
