WOMAN COMMANDS BIG FOUR MASTER

PORTLAND, Jan. 5.—While her husband, Captain F. Orman, lay critically ill in his bunk, Mrs. Isabelle Orman, acting as skipper, brought the four-masted schooner, Jean Somerville, across the Atlantic from the Las Palmas, Canary Islands to Pensacola Bar, off the Florida coast. The voyage was 43 days, and Captain Orman died three days before the vessel reached port. As her husband's body lay shrouded on the midship hatch, the plucky woman guided the craft through the treacherous bars and reaches off Pensacola. So far as known, this is the first time in maritime history that a woman has navigated a ship across the Atlantic.

The Jean Somerville arrived in Mobile, Ala., December 31, having been towed from Pensacola bar by tugs. Word of the schooner's safe arrival was received here by Miss Alice Orman and Dr. Julius S. Orman, of South Portland, daughter and son of the brave woman skipper.

Mrs. Orman was the only person aboard the four-master who knew anything of navigation after her husband was taken ill. She assumed command and hampered by a miserable crew, she expressed it, succeeded in not only bringing the schooner across the ocean, but to the very port to which the vessel was bound when she left Las Palmas on November 8. Even when Mrs. Orman made every effort to bring the craft to port without the aid of tugs, but a norther sprang up and she signalled for help, several tow boats answering.

The news that the Jean Somerville had arrived came in the nick of time to prevent a search by a United States Coast Guard cutter for the schooner, which was overdue. Some anxiety had been felt by the owners, Mrs. Orman has accompanied her husband on voyages for the last twenty-five years and is a licensed navigator.

SAYS RUSSIA WILL SAVE HERSELF IF LEFT ALONE

LONDON, January 5.—On the eve of his return to Copenhagen to resume the prisoner exchange negotiations with Maxim Litvinoff, the Bolshevik representative, James O'Grady told the Mirror correspondent that he believed the four nations would be successful and that the repatriation of British prisoners and British civilians residents in Soviet Russia would be effected by the end of January.

Mr. O'Grady said his consultations since his return from Copenhagen would aid materially in bringing about a settlement. He expressed it as his opinion that Russia would save herself if left alone.

"She is now like a child groping in the dark, but she is growing up," he declared.

"Ninety per cent of Russia's population is illiterate," continued Mr. O'Grady. "The other ten per cent is purely predatory. They are Asiatic people and are at least a thousand years behind our civilization. We must give them time."

"Russia will regenerate herself by her own resources. I believe she will become the America of another new world. The Soviet Government is far more humanitarian, far samer and far more statesmanlike than the Soviet Government of a year ago. Atrocities, of course, are being committed by those Asiatics, but I know that when the perpetrators are adjudged guilty, they are exterminated."

Mr. O'Grady strongly opposed armed intervention in Russia, saying it would be a delusion to build hopes on Admiral Kolchak and General Deneskin, both of whose armies, he added, were broken and beaten.

"Don't let us imagine," Mr. O'Grady asserted, "that sudden and dramatic intervention by Japan will solve the problem of Bolshevism by destroying it. Even a well equipped army of five million men would itself be destroyed by the vastness of Russia if not by its various peoples. The only hope for Russia lies in education."

The recognition of Prince Edward Island as the centre of fur-farming in the world is a scientific industry in constantly increasing evidence. The fame of the Island has spread not only throughout this continent but has crossed both the Atlantic and the Pacific. Norway has drawn upon Prince Edward Island breeders for black foxes with which to establish fur-farming industry in that country. Japanese business men, now investigating industrial conditions in Canada and the United States, are paying a special visit to the Island to get first hand information of fur-farming methods.

Fur-farming is a pursuit which can and will be carried on extensively and profitably in many sections of Canada. But Prince Edward Island has achieved a unique reputation for the industry and is likely to become preeminently a region for its fur as British Columbia is for its salmon or the Prairie Provinces for their wheat.

The Dalhousie players returned to Halifax tonight and Manager Haydon announced that he would renew efforts to have his team play Harvard and Yale at Boston and New York. The collegians won both games in Cape Breton, defeating Sydney and Glace Bay in turn.

These gifts were in addition to \$2,000,000 recently given by the executors of the Standard Oil Company to the Baptist Ministers' and Missionaries' Home Mission Society which apply to the \$100,000,000 fund which the Baptist Church is organizing.
