Yesterday morning Batt's Tug went up to the wreck and if she gets off she will be towed to Pictou. There is no insurance on cargo or schooner.

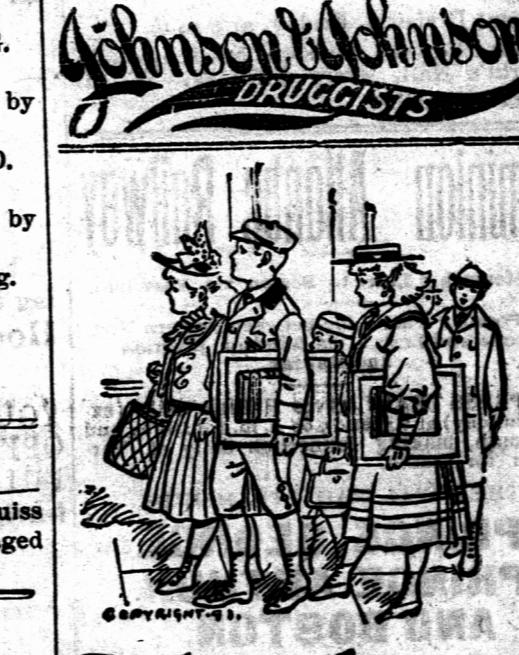
