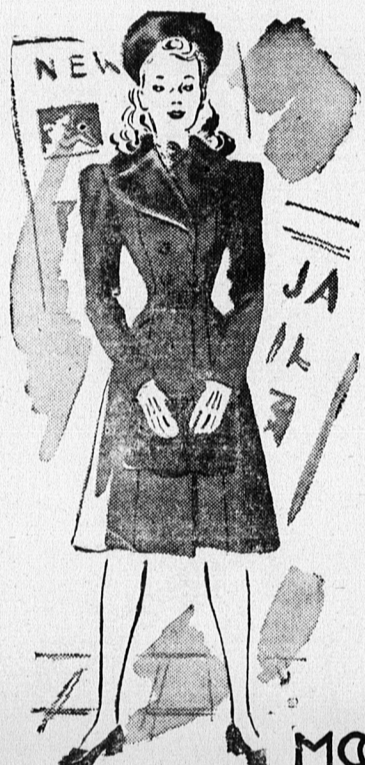

Dean of Tourist Industry Retires

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 19 — Charles Ketchum Howard, much more familiarly known as "Charlie" and "C.K.", has retired from the post of manager, Tourist and Convention Bureau, Canadian National Railways, under the pension rules of the Company, completing a record of fifty years spent in transportation activities. More than that, Mr. Howard is elder brother to every individual engaged in the tourist industry of Canada, being Dean of all those interested in making known to the world the attractions of a holiday in the Dominion. M. E. Duke has been appointed General Tourist and Convention Agent, according to an announcement issued today by C. Johnston, general passenger traffic manager of the System. Mr. Duke was formerly Mr. Howard's assistant and immediately previous to this appointment was general agent, passenger department, at Montreal. He will carry on the duties previously performed by Mr. Howard. During his lengthy career Mr. Howard had charge of the travel arrangements of many distinguished visitors, royalty and commoners, missions and groups, parliamentarians and industrialists and one particular highlight was the establishment of a base at Mattice, in Northwestern Ontario, for a party of newspapermen awaiting the rescue of a crew of United States Naval balloons who had been grounded near Moose Factory during the winter of 1921. The "base" was a sleeping car complete with a coal-fired heater and newspapermen who covered that assignment with their reports in the columns of their headquarters in subway newspapers. Important Duties In the matter of organizing facilities for the comfort of holiday travellers at all seasons, Mr. Howard when in charge of the tourist activities of the Canadian National Railways, performed important services and was responsible for great assistance in directing a volume of holiday traffic towards Canada, principally from the

United States. In another important field, that of obtaining conventions, Mr. Howard eminently succeeded in this in the railway organization, freshly expanded with civic, provincial and federal bodies. Mr. Howard is a native of St. Andrew's, New Brunswick, and there he obtained his early schooling. His first railway service commenced in 1891 and from that year until 1912 he served as operator, station agent and travelling freight agent. When the Intercolonial Railway acquired the St. John and Quebec Railroad, Mr. Howard entered the service of the Government road and in 1916 was transferred to Boston so that the Canadian Government Railways would have closer contact with wartime freight and passenger movements. During this period among the various Missions which Mr. Howard accompanied as Canadian transportation representative, included that to Washington headed by Lord Balfour and that to England led by Colonel Howard. At the time of the Halifax explosion, the then Governor McCall of Massachusetts, organized a relief train staffed with doctors and nurses and well equipped with medical supplies, and invited Mr. Howard to accompany the train to Halifax. Later during the First Great War when the United States Government gave permission for recruiting of British and Canadian residents, the recruiting office was organized by Mr. Howard. Transferred to Toronto It was in 1920 that Mr. Howard was transferred to Toronto to develop the tourist organization and the twenty years that followed were exceedingly busy for Mr. Howard himself and important to Canada and the Canadian National Railways by reason of the volume of traffic obtained during that period. It was also during that period numerous official and semi-official parties came to Canada and for many of these the services of Mr. Howard were requisitioned to effect arrangements and direct their travel. These groups included the Empire Parliamentary Association and the Inter-Parliamentary Union party while individual travel which moved under the charge of Mr. Howard included that of the late Field Marshal Haig, Lord Birkhead, Lord and Lady Willingdon, the Duchess of Athol, the Bishop of London, Lord Darling, Lord Howard and Prime Ministers including Ramsay MacDonald and Stanley Baldwin and the Chief Executives

In Memoriam

MR. WILLIAM LAWSON DOUGLAS (By A. deH. Smith) Little children liked him—and people who were his friends—tribute which could be paid to William Lawson Douglas, who died in Edmonton, Alberta, November 26th. He was born in Hillsboro Head, P. E. I., the son of the late David H. Douglas and although he left his home but seventeen years he has never forgotten the soil bounding in on the coast, the apple orchards, the rolling fields, the winding creeks and woods. He often spoke of these things, for "Bill" Douglas was a simple man who rejoiced in simple things; the trees, the birds; all nature out-of-doors.

After working in Boston for some years he migrated to the Canadian West in 1903, nestlestead in the Coking Lake district, but moved to Edmonton in 1907, where he followed his trade of carpenter. He was a fine craftsman, who insisted upon a good job. Nothing was too much trouble for him and as a result he was sought after by many construction contractors and was seldom without the toll that meant so much to him.

Perhaps what endeared him most to this little community of Bonnie Doon, in Edmonton, was his sunny disposition. The writer cannot remember ever having heard the voicing of any adverse comment and such is often prevalent in a small group of friends. "Bill" Douglas, for ever had a laugh and a joke on his lips, his courage ran high and even in his last hours he was in his great spirit. He would always summon up a grin for the nurses or visitors. Three nurses attended him and their verdict was "We never had such a patient."

He was a member of the Masons, the Oddfellows and of the Knox United Church and the last rites solemnly intoned the universal respect and affection in which he was held. The funeral was very large. At the service the building was crowded and the flowers spoke their message too and in Alberta, where nothing grows outside in November, one wall was built up with wreaths, to the roof. It was a day of bitter wind and snow when "Bill" Douglas was placed at rest in the Mount Pleasant cemetery. He left behind him a wife, the former Christie A. MacLean of Allison, P. E. I.; one daughter, Mrs. Lou Alexander; two brothers and two sisters, John M. of Edmonton, Ontario; Christine A. MacLean of Borden; and a sister, Mrs. Glinthorpe of San Francisco, California; Mrs. Horace Farrington of Chicago. Also nieces Blanche of Montreal, Esthane of San Francisco and nephews Carl of Chicago, George of Boston and Mrs. Elsie Hobbs of Charlottetown. He was buried near William Lawson Douglas. You will not be forgotten.
