SEVERAL passengers were landed by the S. S. Electra in Georgetown Saturday evening.

HARVESTING has begun around Montague; several pieces of grain were cut last week.

DURING the time the Georgetown school was closed the yard was enlarged, a new fence erected and several other improvements made.

THE election of elders in the Montague Presbyterian Church Sunday resulted in the following choice: For Montague, Messrs D. G. Cameron, and D. L. McKinnon. For Victoria Cross, Mr. John Gillis. For Whim Road East, Mr. Chas. Herbert.

THE electric storm which passed over the eastern part of the Island Sunday evening was the fiercest known for some time. A barn belonging to Mr. Matheson of Heatherdale was burned. This barn is in close proximity with the one recently burned by lightning. In Montague several electric-light lamps were destroyed.

Caught in the Storm.

Half a dozen boys left the city Sunday morning in the trim sailing craft "Now Then" under the command of Capt. J. Cameron. The crew were A. Cameron Mahar, Munro, Currie and Hodgson. They were bent on a day's outing. They might have reached home before the storm but after they had been sailing about two miles on the home trip the Captain remembered that he had left his coat behind and then they were compelled to return. When about two miles east of the Asylum they encountered a storm, and had to take in all sail and get under it for shelter. The storm was very severe. Capt. Cameron said he had never, with all his experience encountered the like. The other "old salts" were ditto. Immediately after the squall the wind died out. The crew imagined the curse of the "Flying Dutchman" was upon them as they could not get past the Asylum, and they were compelled to run into that port and make the rest of the voyage on foot. They reached town about 9.30 feeling very wet and hungry, and convinced that there was "no place like home" after all.

OLD SALT.

A Sad Accident.

A most distressing accident occurred in Cumberland, British Columbia, on Saturday, July 21st, when Mr. Lauchlin C. McDonald, a native of P. E. Island, and a son of Mr. Charles McDonald, of Grand View, was accidentally killed.

It appears Mr. McDonald was a carpenter, and was repairing the mid-wall in one of the air shafts of one of the mines, when a small streamer of gas became ignited. Then a heavy explosion took place, breaking through the mid-wall, with a concussion sufficient to break the pit head doors on the main shaft. As soon as possible several of the workmen descended the shaft and found the remains at the bottom of the shaft; the poor fellow having fallen a distance of 300 feet. The deceased was a member of Cumberland L. O. L., I. O. O. F. and other lodges, and was highly esteemed by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was 34 years old and leaves a widow and one child to mourn the loss of a loving father and husband. The parents, of deceased have the sympathy of the whole community in their sad bereavement.

STATISTICS IN PRAYERS.

Clergyman Who Was Determined Not to Exaggerate Facts.

"It is very befitting that the language of prayer should be simple. To use great swelling words in a plea for mercy is a sign of a vulgar taste, not to say of a deficiency. The father who said: 'Lord, deliver us from our sinful diathesis' was very young, but he ought to have known better. The one who begged for an increase of 'subjective intensity' was too old to learn much. And what shall we say of the one who overloaded his supplications with a dazzling array of statistics? When people are in earnest they do not resort to such tricks of speech."

Thus, says the Nashville Christian Advocate. We recall an incident which seems to illustrate the Advocate's remark about statistics in prayer. It was during the first visit of Mr. Moody to Richmond. The great Armory Hall was thronged. The leader of the meeting—not Mr. Moody—called on one of the oldest and most venerable of the local ministers, a man of very simple and direct speech to lead in prayer. "We will join with Dr. R. in prayer, and Dr. R. we wish to pray for the twenty-three who last night requested prayer and also for the forty-seven who to-night requested prayer."

The direct and simple hearted old minister, when he reached that part of the petition, prayed as follows: "Oh, Lord bless the twenty-three persons who stood up last night for a prayer, bless, also, we beseech Thee, for the forty-seven persons who stood up to-night for prayer, although it may be possible, oh, Lord, that some of those who stood up to-night stood up also last night." He was determined not to mislead the Almighty or to make any misrepresentation.—Richmond Religious Herald.

ICED CHICKEN BOUILLON.

(Marion Harland in the Philadelphia North American.)

Cut a large fowl into pieces; put it in a porcelain-lined kettle and cover with cold water. Set at the side of the range and simmer for three hours. Season with celery salt, pepper and onion juice, and set away to cool. When cold, skim off the fat and strain out the bones and meat. Return to the fire, and, when hot, add a quarter of a box of gelatine that has soaked for an hour in a gill of water. When the gelatine is dissolved, take the soup from the fire, strain through a cheesecloth bag, and set in the ice until jelled.

ICE BOUILLON.

Put together in an agate-lined saucepan two pounds of lean beef, minced; one half pound of lean meat also minced and two pounds each of beef and veal bones well cracked. Cover with cold water and bring slowly to a boil, then simmer for four hours. Season with salt, pepper, and two tablespoonfuls of kitchen bouquet and the same quantity of sherry, then remove from the fire. When very cold and like a jelly, skim all fat from the surface of the soup, and heat just enough to enable you to strain out the bones and meat. Set this bouillon in the ice until again jelled and serve very cold.
