Rainville Wins Ontario Singles Title

Will Have Tough Task To Defeat Australian Team

United States Singles Players Losing Opening Matches Of Interzone Series—McGrath Brilliant In Overcoming Wood.

(A.P.-C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, England, July 22.—Australia's Davis Cup team to appear to have victory within their grasp in their interzone series for the trophy, emblem of world tennis supremacy.

The double setback left Captain R. Norris (Dick) Williams' disappointed warriors facing what looked like an impossible task of sweeping the remaining doubles match on Monday, and the two singles on Tuesday, when Shields engages McGrath and Wood takes on Crawford.

The players themselves seem to feel that the task is too great. Nobody was particularly surprised at Crawford's victory over Shields, as he had vanquished the No. 1 ranking American in the semi-finals of the all-England championships here two weeks ago, but McGrath's magnificent play against Wood, who is regarded in England as one of the world's greatest shotmakers, came as a double-barrelled shock.

McGrath, a little fellow with an unorthodox, two-handed backhand, never has shown American tennis spectators anything like the dazzling all-court game that he employed against Wood.

The slender New Yorker looked like a man trying to fight a swarm of bees with a fly swatter as he swung widely and wildly at McGrath's assorted returns. Just when it looked like he had McGrath's fore-hand muzzled, the Aussie would sting him with red-hot backhand unorthodox, two-handed backhand.

Shields started off poorly against Crawford and then made a rally to almost win the third set. The American was nervous as the match opened and proved an easy victim for Crawford's steady stroking. He rallied marvelously in the final chapter and led up to the last two games. Several times he was within two points of set victory.

FORT DODGE SWIMMER WINS EASILY

Marvin Nelson Captures Annual 15-mile Swim By Over 14 Minutes—Young Forced Out.

(By William Weekes Associated Press Staff Writer) CHICAGO, July 22.—Marvin Nelson, 19-year-old giant from Fort Dodge, Ia., swam to a second straight triumph in the second annual \$10,000 William Randolph Hearst-Herald and Examiner 15-mile swim in Lake Michigan.

King's Prize Won By Crack British Army Rifleman

Veteran Toronto Man Is Best Of Canadians, Finishing Thirteenth To Take Back Many Other Coveted Trophies.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BISLEY CAMP, England, July 22.—The Canadians who take many prized trophies back to Canada from the big Imperial meeting of the National Rifle Association, but they will not take the biggest award of them all—the King's Prize.

A crack British army shot, 33-year-old Captain J. Barlow of the West Yorkshire Regiment, captured that coveted event in Saturday's final after shooting off a tie with Captain J. Sedgewick of the Durham Regiment.

Nevertheless, the sharpshooting Canadian contingent won up a glorious challenge with three more big successes. Sergeant James Borland of the 48th Highlanders, Toronto, captured the Prince of Wales prize of \$500, second only to the King's and Private P. J. Martinson of La Tuque, Quebec, won both of Bisley's big aggregates, the grand and all-comers.

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Can. Davis Cup Captain Defeated In Straight Sets

Good Showing In Canadian Tourney All Midget Montrealeer Needs To Virtually Gain Top Ranking For Next Year.

(By Elmer DuImage Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, July 22.—Back on the tennis heights in quest of No. 1 ranking in Canada, Marcel Rainville of Montreal tuned his small-size, non-explosive court armaments tonight for an assault on the last strong-veteran won the Ontario singles crown yesterday.

One of the largest galleries that ever watched a tennis battle in Ontario, about 6,000, saw Rainville play havoc with the celebrated fore-hand smashes of Gilbert Nunn of Toronto, overcoming the tall captain of Canada's 1934 Davis Cup team in straight sets, 6-1, 7-5, 6-3.

It was the second triumph of the year for the soft-stroking French-Canadian over the heavy-hitting Nunn. In the spring Davis Cup trials Rainville won just as decisively as he did yesterday, but this mid-season victory, coming on top of Rainville's singles win a week before in the Eastern Canadian championships at Ottawa, had more important consequences.

The midget Montrealeer was left in a position where he needed only to make a good showing in the Canadian tournament this week to be virtually certain of top ranking for the year. Without losing a set, he defeated Walter Martin of Toronto and Nunn in successive days to engineer his first Ontario singles triumph.

Rainville's victory was the only complete Quebec conquest, though Montreal players were in every one of the five finals. Beaten by Mrs. Gilbert Nunn's defending champion in the women's singles final, Mrs. W. D. Patrick of Montreal went back with Mrs. L. H. Beer of Toronto as partner and captured the women's doubles title, defeating Edrie Billing and Yvette Sawyer of Montreal.

Mrs. Beer also had a hand in the mixed doubles final, teaming with George Leclerc of Ottawa to upset Miss Billing and Douglas Grant of Halifax, 7-5, 6-0. The veteran Ottawa player played in three matches Saturday and won them all.

The mixed doubles final was the third match of the afternoon for Miss Billing and Grant. They had downed Dianna Pope of London Ont., and Bill Piggett of Hamilton in a quarter-final contest, 10-8, 7-5. Set-points were against the pair four times in the first set and five times in the second. But they won both.

In the semi-finals they upset Mrs. Patrick and Jim McDougall of Toronto, 6-4, 7-5 while Mrs. Beer and Leclerc were beating Mrs. O. G. Gray and John Proctor, Toronto, 3-6, 6-4. After putting up a stiff battle for one set, the Montreal-Halifax pair succumbed completely.

Leclerc's terrific overhead hitting featured the final. The blonde Ottawa star had a big edge over Grant, himself a fine smash artist, and Mrs. Beer contributed brilliant net work.

BONTHON AGAIN BOWS TO LOVELOCK

(A.P.-C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, July 22.—Jack Lovelock, New Zealander, tonight was acclaimed as the world's premier miler following his second defeat of Princeton's Bill Bonthon.

Lovelock's triumph over the United States ace of the cinder pathways was the highlight of the track and field meet Saturday at the White City Stadium between Oxford-Cambridge and Princeton-Cornell University teams.

The home forces triumphed by snatching seven firsts to five for the visitors. Only first places counted in the meet. Princeton-Cornell won last year, eight-four. The New Zealand schoolmaster and Oxford student, handicapped by a knee operation which was thought to have robbed him of his speed, outraced Bonthon by a yard in 4 minutes 16.4 seconds, a far cry from his 4:07.6 record mile victory of last year at Princeton but not bad time over an inferior track made slow by an overnight rain.
