ORWELL COVE RESIDENT PASSES--Mrs. Malcolm W. Gillis, formerly a resident of Orwell Cove, P.E.I., died Saturday at Quinny, Mass. It was learned yesterday. The body will be sent to this province for burial. Mrs. Gillis had been in the United States for nine years.

ROAD OPEN--The Charlotte-town-Montague highway is again open to motor traffic. Government snow plows working Friday and Saturday on the 30-mile stretch of pavement arrived at Montague late Friday night. The road had been blocked by snow since early in the winter. Cars from Montague, Cardigan and Georgetown visited the city Saturday.

HOUSE PARTY--The largest crowd ever to attend the regular Saturday night house parties at the local M.C.A. packed the building and spent a very enjoyable evening Saturday. Sailors, soldiers and airmen were present and joined in the dancing sports and other amusements which were included on a bang-up program. A feature attraction was the tap dancing display put on by soldier Eddie Bourgeois of Beach Grove. Refreshments were served by the Ladies Saturday night committee.

CHARTER FLIGHT--Capt. Carl Burke of the Maritime Central Airways took seven passengers from Moncton to this province Saturday evening on a charter flight. The last regular plane from New Brunswick was filled with passengers and the seven were unable to get seats. Three of them, including Major E. Green, the Salvation Army in Saint John, had to be in Charlottetown that evening so they got together and with four others chartered the plane. Capt. Burke returned to Moncton with the Barkley-Crow aircraft. Leaving there at 6.15 he stopped at Summerside on the way back and let one passenger off. The remaining six came through to the city.

Col. R. J. Manion Meets With A. R. P. Memorial Service Committee Here

Col. R. J. Manion, M.D., Director of the Civilian Defence Committee, R.P. Ottawa, met with the Provincial Air Raids Precaution Committee in Charlottetown Saturday morning and discussed matters pertaining to blackouts and other A.R.P. work in this province. The Charlottetown branch of the committee was also represented at the meeting.

Col. Manion made many inquiries about the organization in Prince Edward Island and expressed himself as being very well pleased with the set-up here. In the general discussion the Director of A.R.P. work in this province was asked by those present, the Director of A.R.P. work in the Dominion told the provincial committee that aircs would be provided for Charlottetown and other points on the island within about three weeks time.

Memorial Service For Airmen Held In Trinity Church

A memorial service was held at Trinity United Church yesterday morning for Sgt. Pilot Allison Boyce MacKie of Southport, and Sgt. Observer Ernest Ashton Trenedick, Charlottetown, both of whom were killed in action while serving overseas with the Royal Canadian Air Force. The service was conducted by Rev. Hugh Miller who paid a touching tribute to the memory of the two airmen.

In paying this tribute, Mr. Miller spoke as follows:

Today we pay tribute to the valour and sacrifice of two young men of our church who made the supreme sacrifice in the cause for liberty and in doing so we commemorate their spirit and memory: Sgt. Pilot Allison Boyce MacKie, Sgt. Observer Ernest Ashton Trenedick.

Sgt. Pilot MacKie, Southport, was well known in the city and by the people of Trinity Church.

Sgt. Observer Trenedick was a native of West Devon. The last few years he lived in our city and attended College and Trinity Church.

Both of these young men were esteemed for their character and outlook on life. They heard the call of their country and fully realizing the dangers of war, but also realizing the ideals at stake and motivated by high sense of duty, they proceeded overseas and were soon engaged against the enemy.

Sgt. Observer Trenedick was reported missing in October 1941 and later declared killed in action.

Sgt. Pilot MacKie was killed in action November 1941. He is buried in Stirlingshire, Scotland.

These are the first casualties from this church. We pay tribute to their bravery and sacrifice and commend their loved ones to Him, whose love and peace are assured. May we be worthy of their devotion and sacrifice. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

Then followed one minute silence the congregation standing and Hymn 525.

Today Major Green will visit No. 62 C.A.B.T.C. at Beach Grove and attend at eight o'clock the services in the Salvation Army Hall.

Boothroyd of Trinity Church, who delivered a pointed and interesting sermon on "Judgment on the Day." The wide sayings of Jesus is "Judge not that ye be not judged, for with what judgment ye judge ye shall be judged." Constantly we judge, intentional or otherwise, individual matters and so often without knowing all the facts that should be considered. And as we choose, we express opinions, we are at the same time judging ourselves. We must judge, we must choose, we must decide and we must accept the consequences of our choices and decisions. Some of the judgments on Jesus as approached the first Easter were those of the Scribes and Pharisees, they heard Christ's message, but they rejected and clung to the old way. Pilate found in Christ no fault, and still sacrificed an innocent man for his own material convenience. Judas judged and chose three pieces of silver, his disciples chose and they forsok him and fled. So we have the judgment of his enemies which reveals them as sons of evil and stupid intolerance, choosing outward conformity rather than the kingdom within His friends' judgment.

Havana also reported hearing a ship believed to be a United States Coast Guard vessel, sending an S.O.S. saying the vessel was abandoned after being torpedoed, shelled and machine-gunned in the vicinity of the French Island of Guadeloupe. This ship's fate was not positively determined, nor was the S.O.S. satisfactorily identified.

Twenty survivors of the American freighter Condonia were landed Saturday at West Palm Beach, Fla. They said their ship had been torpedoed twice and shelled a week ago in the Caribbean.
