(Continued from page 1) the League had before it a well devised plan, which it hoped would prove effective.

After a short discussion and some slight change in the form of pledge, it was suggested that the candidates go only sign it but beside this go to proper officer and make affidavit as to their sincerity. The pledge was then signed by the candidates and arrangements made for the taking of the affidavit. Up to a late hour last night the affidavit had not been made by all the candidates, but as soon as completed it will be given publicity.

During the discussion the candidates expressed their willingness to aid the League in having the party workers sign this pledge. The question of finance was also considered the League expressing its desire for at least two or three thousand dollars as a guarantee fund, which they would ask for, only when absolute necessary. A small percentage might be paid forthwith to cover current expenditure. A liberal subscription was asked for from the candidates, which matter they agreed to consider. The balance it is expected will come from the citizens. Since the meeting place, the two of the candidates have agreed to give \$250 each toward the fund, if the successive efforts are as successful as those of yesterday, the League efforts will not be in vain.
