**U. S. Arms
Control Plan
Accepted**

(C. P.-A. P.)
(By Guardian's Special Wire)
GENEVA, Feb. 14—A special committee of the World Disarmament Conference today accepted the United States plan for control of the traffic in arms as the basis of discussion on such a convention.

The plan, some of the details of which aroused British and Italian objections at this stage, envisages regulation of traffic and manufacture of arms, establishment of an automatic international supervisory body, and publicity for national expenditures on arms.

Hugh Wilson, United States Minister to Switzerland, placed the plan before the committee on arms traffic as it resumed after weeks of idleness. He said the United States government "attaches peculiar importance to the success of the project."

**WILL CONSIDER
APPLICATIONS
ON MERITS**

Minister of Finance
Refers To Farm
Loan Board.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
OTTAWA, Feb. 16—Every application will be considered on its merits, Finance Minister E. N. Rhodes told the House of Commons today, referring to the new set-up for the Farm Loan Board. He was replying to members who claimed farmers in dried-out areas had been refused loans under the present system.

With the blessing of all parties, the government bill establishing a fund of \$90,000,000 and extending farm loans to all Provinces, received second reading today. Debate in committee stage will continue next week which may see the bill through the House and into the Senate.

A part of the time was taken by Earle Rowe (Cons. Dufferin-Simco) criticizing the Hepburn Government in Ontario. He claimed the Ontario Development Board had been stopped making loans to the farmers in which they are the soundness of the credit of the farmers, particularly in Ontario, said Mr. R. E. The attitude of the Hepburn Government in discontinuing loans to farmers had contributed to this. There were still 13,000 applications approved by the Ontario Farm Loan Board, which loans had not been made.

Ontario Liberal members, Colin Campbell of Frontenac-Addington, and W. H. Mills of West Egin, said Mr. Rowe had argued the former Hepburn Government had made loans to its friends. Yet the Ontario Board had a surplus. Such reckless charges reflected seriously on the credit of the farmers and might easily prejudice their chances of obtaining capital either from private lending companies or from the Dominion Loan Board.

Replying to Dr. F. W. Gershaw (Lib. Medicine Hat) the Finance Minister said each loan application would be settled on its merits and irrespective of the location of the farmer.

W. H. Golding (Lib. Huron South) said no good purpose would be served by Mr. Rowe's political discussion of the situation in Ontario. It would be discussed in the Legislature at the proper time and the House should stick to the bill before it.

J. A. Bradette (Lib. Temiskaming North) urged the act be interpreted widely enough to permit settlers in northern Ontario who had not yet obtained title to their lands from the Crown to obtain loans. Mr. Rhodes said it should be remembered the bill was a farm loan measure and not a colonization measure although he had every desire to help the settlers.

**SENATOR
J. J. HUGHES
CONDEMNS WAR**

OTTAWA, Feb. 16—War was condemned as a "monstrous evil" by Hon. J. J. Hughes (Lib. Prince Edward Island) who asked the Senate to approve a sweeping resolution affecting citizens and industries of the country in the event of Canada again going to war.

His proposal advocated:
(A) Mobilization and conscription of all the "human power" and all material wealth of the nation.
(B) Establishment of a war council representing the provinces and the Dominion to have supreme control of war activities.
(C) Authority of the war council to assign men and women in Canada to whatever positions it thought they were best qualified to fill, but making as few changes as possible in their daily occupations.
(D) Wages, salary or income "from the Governor-General down," including army officers, not to be greater than the pay of the common soldier in the field, plus a reasonable amount for dependents.
(E) No money to be borrowed for war purposes but all war expenses to be met by taxation and capital levies so as not to increase the country's debt.

Adjourns Debate

Adjournment of the debate was moved by Senator J. J. Murdoch (Lib. Ottawa). While the Senate adjourned until next Tuesday night, Senator Murdoch is not expected to speak before the latter part of next week.

"War has become revolutionized," Senator Hughes declared. "It is to be no longer confined to the professional soldiers. Women and children, the aged and the sick are to be its chief victims in future."

Long ago the wealth, the pride and the profit should have been taken out of war but it was never too late to mend, he said. "To me it seems a monstrous thing that in war, or in any other conceivable circumstance, property should be regarded as more sacred than human life. In my opinion not all the wealth of Canada nor all the wealth of the world is equal in value to one human life, and yet there may be such a thing as a righteous war where men would be in duty bound to offer their lives."

Comparison

"In the last war in which we were engaged some men were conscripted for the trenches at \$1.10 a day where a few others were at death prevailed, while other men were coaxed to work in the factories or allowed to follow their ordinary occupations at many dollars a day. One business concern had made \$5,000,000 in a contract during the war and had invested the profits in high interest-bearing, non-taxable bonds for which the country was paying, he said.

Canada was "new in the business" and naturally made many mistakes in the last war, but people should not go too far in their criticism of what took place. "For time immemorial," he proceeded, "war meant glory and profit for the few and death for the many. The last one surpassed all previous wars in these respects and we are told that the next, if it ever comes, will be 1,000 fold worse than this last. Let us, therefore, highly resolve that we will do what we can to see that it shall never come again.

"I believe that if the people of all the democratic countries, the countries in which they all have a voice in the management of national affairs, would unite in declaring that if the demon war should ever again visit them, all would bear alike its horrors and its burdens. This general resolve on the part of the masses, and surely the classes as well, might do much to rid the earth of this monstrous evil."

There was not much likelihood of Canada ever being engaged in another war, but if there was no "possibility" of his resolution would be superfluous, said Senator Hughes.

Immunity from the "dread war" was one of the favors enjoyed by this country. The Dominion was not preparing to attack any nation and no nation was preparing to attack her. When, however, people read one day of peace treaties and alliances that had been prepared to prevent war and learned the next day the nations signing these pacts were speeding up their armament factories it caused food for thought.

He considered the accord of aerial warfare recently entered into between France and England was a "gladdening sign."
