FREE SELLING CHECKED RISE IN STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, March 9—The dullness which overcame the stock market after the lively dealings of the morning was due to discouragement over the observed effect of the market to continue the advance in prices. Free selling to realize profits was the most material hindrance, and a professional party in the speculation joined in with short selling, watchful for symptoms of a culmination of the rise. The heavy control of the market was by no means abandoned, as seen in the late revival of United States Steel and the absorbent power in face of the large selling to realize had an encouraging effect on speculative sentiment. The fostering care given to the support of prices is credited to the most influential banking interests and the motives attributed to them is to help the market for the large bond flotations which they have in hand and in prospect. At the same time, an active speculation in stocks at this time is professedly depressed by the larger banking interests since such a movement serves to direct attention and resources from the bond market. The determination of the New York city financial authorities to fix the \$40,000,000 issue of corporate stock at 41 per cent, has had a harmful effect, as it was accepted as a settlement of a vexed problem and assurance of the success of the offerings by agreement with the bankers. The incident serves as an object lesson nevertheless, of the exigencies forced upon the seekers of new capital. Another motive for strengthening the stock market by banking support, which was advanced as an explanation of the current activity is the favorable effect thus produced on trade activity. Complaints were heard from the steel trade of the discouraging effect on the demand from consumers, of the long decline in prices of stock which set in after the first of the year. Stimulated demand is looked for from the brisk recovery which has occurred in the price of United States Steel. Revival rumors of dividend increases were used with effect in advancing prices today. New York Central was particularly affected by this influence. Hopeful views were expressed, also, on the improving prospects for corporations on the side of national legislation. Satisfaction was professed with the steps being taken in shaping the railroad bill in congress. It was said, also, that opinions by learned counsel of the great corporations as to the probable outcome of the government's anti-trust suits before the supreme court had changed since the period of greatest anxiety on that subject. An excellent effect was produced by the certainty of large foreign participation in the New York city bond
