Wants for the Motorist BY ALBERT L. CLOUGH BURNED OIL ON WALLS OF LEAKY CYLINDER

A. H. B. writes: The last time that I removed the cylinder-head from my engine, I found the pistons of the three cylinders carbonized in about the usual degree, but that of the fourth cylinder had more than twice the carbon on it.

Answer: There is no reason to believe that this fourth cylinder has been overheated. You would have known it at the time, if it had. This brown color is due, we think, to the blowing past the piston of an excessive volume of hot, oil laden gases, from which burned oil is deposited upon the walls, faster than the rather loose rings can wipe it off.

CLOCK WISE AND ANTI-CLOCK WISE MAGNETOS H. M. W. asks: What is the method of procedure required to a four cylinder clockwise rotation magnetos, so that it will operate in the anti-clockwise direction?

Answer: Generally speaking it is necessary to remove the entire breaker mechanism and substitute for it the anti-clockwise breaker. Some of the parts of one are usually capable of being utilized in the other, but changing over is a rather technical matter. It is also necessary to change the point of contact of the gears, that operate the distributor, by marks on the teeth, a change in the position of the spark advance arm is also required, but this arm is usually made adjustable so that this can be readily accomplished.

CAUSES OF HARD STARTING T. W. asks: What makes my Ford engine start so hard? Sometimes I crank for an hour before I can get it going. My headlights bulbs burn out very soon. Why is this?

Answer: The following, among other conditions, lead to difficult starting: Thick oil on the timer segments; coil vibrators adjusted with too wide gaps; spark plug points too far separated; weak magneto contact; use of very low grade gasoline; carburetor too closely adjusted; failure of the shocking device properly to prime the manifold; cylinder oil too stiff from cold to permit the required cranking speed to be attained; loading of the cylinders with excess fuel from excessive priming.

CLEANING TOP FABRIC M. E. B. asks: How can I clean the inside fabric of a touring car top, which has become stained and dirty?

Answer: Go over the entire fabric with a stiff brush, in order to remove all loose dirt. Then use a brush or sponge wet with a suds made from any mild soap. After this treatment is completed, rinse thoroughly with clean water and a sponge and dry the material with cloths.

FLY FROM THE PACIFIC OCEAN TO ATLANTIC IN 22 HOURS, 32 MINUTES



Lieutenant William D. Coney Starting from San Diego, Cal., flew from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean in 22 hours, 32 minutes. He finished at Jacksonville, Fla., the distance being 2,079 miles. Few Stake Races On New Brunswick Tracks Is Latest

FREDERICTON, March 3.—The New Brunswick tracks in the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit, which was recently organized, will probably not give as many stake races in connection with the fall fairs this year as were offered last season.

Fredericton, Woodstock and St. Stephen will each have four days in connection with their exhibitions, while Chatham will have either three or four days racing during the fair week. The chances as the programmes will provide for not more than one stake to be raced daily and possibly not that many.

Offerings of stake races will be made up during the next few days by all the tracks, as the programmes should be in the hands of O. J. Bishop, the circuit secretary, yesterday. One reason for curtailing the number of stake races is that better contests will doubtless result after some of the horses which now have big time allowances have raced themselves into the classes their performances show they are fitted for.

Verne Corbett Dies Following Knockout From Young Griffio PUEBLO, Colo., Mar. 2.—Young Corbett, a local boxer, died from injuries received in the last round of a four-round bout with Young Griffio here tonight. He died without regaining consciousness half an hour after being carried from the ring. His real name was John Shank. He was a bantamweight and 17 years of age.

Physicians say death was caused by concussion of the brain and internal bleeding, probably the result of a fall from a blow to the jaw and neck by Young Griffio, whose real name is Jack Blanda. Blanda was arrested and held pending investigation by Coroner Dibble. Blanda is 16 years old.
