Division Four Officials Likely Enroute to Ottawa

MONTREAL, Sept. 21—R. J. Tallon, president; Frank McKenna vice president, and Charles Dickie secretary of division number four, the three principal officers of the Canadian shipmen's unions, left Montreal today for an unstated destination their only message to their office employees being that they would be back tomorrow night. The probability is that these three officials have left for Ottawa to further discuss the situation with members of the government.

The sessions of the conciliation board investigating the dispute between the International Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees, and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company were resumed today and it is stated that the evidence will be completed tomorrow night. The question of working conditions has already been settled between the men and the company and there remains only the question of wages outstanding.

U. S. Senate Defeats Soldiers' Bill

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21—The soldiers' bonus bill failed today. The senate vote falling short of the necessary two thirds majority. The senate vote was 44 to 28 and came within a few hours after the house had passed the measure over the President's veto 258 to 54.

NIJNI TO GET LESSONS IN CLEANLINESS

NIJNI, Russia, Sept. 21—A sanitary school where pupils will be instructed in cleanliness and the purposes of disinfection as a precautionary measure against conditions which may develop this coming winter has been organized here by Dr. Mark Godfrey, of Columbus, Ohio, in charge of medical work for the American Relief Administration in this district. This step by Dr. Godfrey is a part of the nation wide scheme inaugurated by the A. R. A. to blot out disease epidemics and clean up Russia, for which the American Red Cross has turned over \$8,000,000 worth of medical supplies and disinfectant.

"Delousing and disinfecting have been poorly carried out everywhere in this Government," explained Dr. Godfrey. "This was no doubt due to lack of materials. However with the arrival of equipment and medical supplies the work is now progressing."

FORMER KAISER IS DETERMINED TO GET MARRIED

POTSDAM, Sept. 21.—The marriage of former Emperor William to the widowed Princess Hermine Von Schoenach-Carolath will probably take place in November of this year. It was announced by a family council of the house of Hohenzollern held here. The council was attended by all the ex-Emperor's sons with the exception of ex-Crown Prince Frederick William who is with his father at Doorn. It was said that all the sons and the ex-crown princess had consented to the marriage.

The announcement was made by Friedrich Von Berg, chief of the civil cabinet of the House of Hohenzollern. Princess Von Schoenach-Carolath was born to Princess Reuss of the Elder line.

NATIVES ARE FLEEING BEFORE SUN YAT SEN

KUANGKANG, Kiangsi Province, China, Sept. 21.—Wealthy Chinese with their families and valuables are fleeing from Nanchang, capital of Kiangsi Province, as the army of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the South China leader, advances northward. Looking at the hands of the southern troops is feared. Two Japanese, also British and United States vessels, are here. Dr. Sun's army has captured Kanche Ki, in the south of Kiangsi Province. A report from the south, June 10, said that the army of Wu Pei-fu were retreating northward.

HOME, NOT POLITICS IS WOMAN'S SPHERE

(Montreal Star.)

"I believe a woman should be a woman above anything else. Her work does not lie in the blundering sphere of politics. I think she should keep out of that field, as it corrupts her finer nature and destroys her power for good among humanity."

This declared Baroness Roessler-Lawler, who has very little sympathy with the modern fashion craze, to The Star at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel. "I belong to the old school; I think it is so much the best. I always kept out of politics because I think it is not a field for women."

The Baroness, accompanied by her daughter, is visiting relatives in Canada. "You know," she said, "I was born in this country. Toronto is my native city and I love Canada and the people here."

Baroness Lawler said the House of Lords was quite right in its decision excluding women. "I don't think they have any right to a seat there," she said, "and I don't see why they should insist on having one. Tradition is a big thing in England, and I don't think women will ever overcome it in this case. It is all right for them to use the franchise if they do so wisely. But women are so bad I don't know whether their influence will be for better or worse. If they were better I think men would be much better; and they certainly could be a great deal better."

Doesn't Like Bobbed Hair.

Speaking of the fashions and fads of the modern girl, Baroness Lawler voiced her disapproval in no uncertain language. "What could be more hideous or barbaric than bobbed hair?" she asked. "I think it is frightful. In England, where it is less common, we were told that it was a fashion that belonged almost exclusively to the American shopping, but I notice all classes wear their hair bobbed. It is awful. Woman's glory has always been her head of hair. These long wavy tresses—and now the style is to dock those precious locks for that fluffy, scraggy style known as bobbed hair. Could anything be more frightful? Fashion preys on the frivolous. But I think the bobbed hair styles is the most dreadful of all."

"I am glad to hear that it is dying out, but what surprises me and has surprised almost everyone who has not been interested in such fads, is to believe girls could be so inconsiderate as to allow their precious locks to suffer such an indignity at the shears of fashion's frivolous vogue."

"In the school of fashion Canada seems to copy a great deal from the United States. And you know some of the styles are most ugly. Every time I see a girl on the street with bobbed hair, I wonder about it all. There could hardly be anything so outrageous
