A ruling on what the word "possession" means in respect to migratory birds has recently been released by the Department of Mines and Resources at Ottawa. For instance: The daily bag limit on ducks (exclusive of Mergansers—meaning shell ducks) is 7. The possession limit is 14. In the past we took it for granted that the word possession dealt with ducks actually in possession in the field. Such is not the case. If a gunner places 14 ducks in cold storage he cannot legally shoot any more until those birds are disposed of. If he takes a pair out of storage and serves them on the table he can then go out and shoot another pair.

The same principle applies to the ducks he gives to his friends until they are disposed of. If a gunner shoots 14 ducks and gives 7 to a friend he cannot, until those ducks are disposed of, go out and shoot another 7. In the meaning of the Migratory Birds Convention Act the word "possession" applies to the gunner who shoots the ducks or geese as the case may be. To get back to the subject of

### Woodcock Ready To Fight Again

LONDON, May 27 — (AP) — Bruce Woodcock, British heavyweight champion informed the Boxing Control Board today that he is fit and ready to fight again after an injury-enforced absence from the ring of more than a year.

The Board promptly announced Freddie Mills, king of Britain's light heavyweights, would be given the first chance at Woodcock's title. No date was set.

Woodcock suffered a broken jaw in losing to Joe Balsi in a non-title fight last year and subsequently developed eye trouble.

The Woodcock-Mills championship fight probably will have to await late summer. Mills has a fight scheduled with Gus Lesnevich for the world light heavyweight title at London's White City Stadium on July 26.

Mike concludes, "As I have said time and again, night harness racing here is more of a family game and Ma and Pa do not visit the \$50 windows."

### Hogan Likely To Play Again In P.G.A. Tourney

FORT WORTH, Tex., May 27—(AP) — Don't take seriously Ben Hogan's statement that he won't again play in the National P.G.A. tournament. Ben admits making it, says he wasn't misquoted in the least, but things look a lot different now to the fellow who won the big links show after 212 weary holes. As he moved out today in the first round of the Colonial National Invitation, golf's pine knot declared: "I still think the tournament is too long, but they can't do anything about it. I may try again next year."

His colleagues of the fairways brigade will tell you that means he will be back. Hogan was like the fellow who had done a 14-hour day in the office and decided he ought to get into something that would give him time to see more than the boss' face. Seven days of high-pressure play had taken their toll and for a few hours at least, he probably convinced himself he'd had enough. Hogan started taking a different view of the situation as soon as he had flown into home town, Fort Worth, snatched a few hours sleep and shot a one-under-par 69 on Colonial Country Club course. The 134-pound Texan is the favorite as usual in the Colonial tournament in which he matches birdies with 26 crack professionals and three amateurs over four days of stroke play.
