Head Offices in New Prowse Block—Charlottetown

There were sixty passengers from East River ports by the S. S. City of London yesterday morning and the following cargo: twenty sheep one beef cow, ten cases eggs and five bags potatoes.

The market yesterday was largely attended and prices on butter and eggs were slightly advanced. Quite a number of ducks and fowl were offered and met with ready sale bringing good prices. Blueberries and apples were the most important articles and with the large quantity of flowers made the market quite a gay building. The full list of market prices appear elsewhere.

The new coach No. 14 built at the P.E.I. Railway works, was given a trial trip yesterday. It is built after the same pattern as the I.C.R., and C.P.R. cars, and has a first class smoker neatly upholstered and is flushed inside in mahogany. The car is supplied with steam heaters and has flushing closets. The doors are fitted with the patent Corban spring which keeps them from slamming. The work reflects great credit on the builders.
