—NEXT DOOR TO US
The Halifax disaster is the most tragic explosion in the number of lives lost in the last quarter century. Indeed few catastrophes of any nature exceed it in the number of dead. Among them are the Messina earthquake in 1908 when approximately two hundred thousand lives were lost the Mont Pelée volcanic eruption on the Island of Martinique in 1902, when forty thousand persons lost their lives, and an earthquake in the interior of Italy in 1905, when 1,500 dead was the toll.

The Tripouco theatre fire in Chicago in 1903 claimed 555 lives, while the sinking of the excursion steamship General Slocum, in the East River, New York, in 1904, left a death list of about 1,400. In 1906 the earthquake and fire in San Francisco took the lives of approximately 1,000 persons, while the loss of the steamship Titanic, in collision with an iceberg in 1912, resulted in a toll of 1,503 dead. In 1914 the Steamship Empress of Ireland went down in the St. Lawrence river, with the loss of 1,027 lives. Then followed the sinking of the Lusitania by a German torpedo and the steamship Eastland in the Chicago river in 1915, with death lists respectively of 1,198 and 812. In October of this year it was reported that four thousand persons had lost their lives in a munition explosion in Austria. But the report never has been confirmed.

Now is the time to replace broken and missing pieces in that good china set.

A SOLDIER'S VIEW BEFORE ELECTION

Hoped His Native Province Would Vote for Union Government and Stand by the Boys.

The following letter has been received by an Island lady from a soldier in France:

Somewhere in France, Nov. 3rd, 1917.

Dear Friend:—Received your nice box of cake and fudge, cannot begin to tell you how I appreciate it, as anything from P.E.I. sure tastes good. Well dear friend we are patiently waiting to see and hear how this election is going to come out, of course we can depend on our P.E.I. ladies and gents to do their duty in helping send more men, as they have too much true blood in their veins to be untrue to us boys who are fighting for them.

I was somewhat surprised to read in the Island papers I received the other day that those exemption boards have done very little, for I know of several young men in those places that could easily do the khaki and come to the rescue. All the boys I know here, and that is no few, as I have been in France since Nov. 1914, are counting the days and hope to be spared to vote for Sir Robert Borden, as I will do his duty to us boys. I tell you what there is nothing cheers a soldier's heart more than to hear of more men coming as it shows we are not forgotten. I hope and pray that every mother and sister having a son or brother in khaki will vote for the Union Government, if not we will soon be all out of it, for we must get help.

I was delighted to see so many staunch Liberals leave Sir Wilfred, and his flock and join the Union. I always voted Liberal and had an uncle a Liberal member for but could not vote against Conscription, Oh no. I read a letter that one of my pals here got from a lady friend of his giving a very poor advice, or good one, she thought, for him to vote for Laurier or she was done with him, guess she had better be careful in her remarks, as she said "Oh this horrid conscription, we might just as well have the German rule." Oh shame lady—truly this is pro-German talk. I cannot see why people want to stick to party for this is a Win-the-War not Party Election, as I thought the folk of the island village of ——— would not vote to help us boys I would never want to plant my foot there again, where I was born 25 years ago. Surely the true Christian of our little Baptist Church on the hill, where I commenced the Sabbath before I left, will be true to us as there are 5 from that little flock here in France. I have confidence in all the good, true Baptist folk on P. E. I., no matter on what side they have always voted, to support the Win-the-War Union Government.

Now in answer to your inquiry about the conditions of our soldiers in England, I must say those boys that are writing such shameful letters ought to be ashamed. They must tell how class that know all this disgraceful conduct. I have been twice wounded, having lost part of two of my fingers on the left hand in the last battle, was in England in a convalescent

hospital for 3 months and can truthfully say I met or fell into no such class. Those things can be avoided, but not by a certain class. I think those ladies that are circulating such low, mean stories don't think much of themselves, to repeat it, and if they are professing Christians, prayer would be better than so much fault-finding in time of war. Well dear friend it will tire you reading this long epistle, but I just had some leisure moments to devote writing to my friends. I met some young men the other day I know quite well and they sure are a credit to their country. Probably you know them, will just give their initials: G. M., F. D. and A. B.

Hope to get the socks and gloves soon, as we sure need them as the weather is very cold and muddy just now. Your Red Cross is certainly doing its bit, glad you made so much at your bean supper, I must read my Chapter and say a prayer to the rest of us.


Socks Appreciated
