Germans Spreading Loathsome Disease

LONDON, Oct. 12.—(New York Times)—The Daily Express this morning says:

The depth of infamy, to which the German nation has descended in its war against civilized mankind, is shown by the official announcement from Bucharest of the discovery in the German legion of flagons labelled "Virus Morve" intended to propagate a simultaneous epidemic among men and horses. The fact that a representative of the United States Legion witnessed the discovery is convincing proof of its truth. "Virus Morve" produces one of the most loathsome diseases known to mankind, generally known as glanders, said one of the most eminent pathologists in this country to the Daily Express representative yesterday. "It would be fiendish to spread in among human beings, to whom it is practically always fatal. Death may come rapidly or gradually and victims might undergo terrible sufferings."

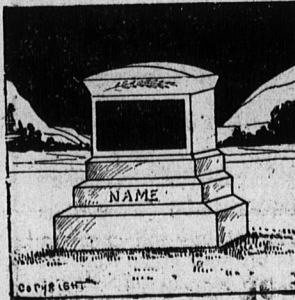
