Lose Last Night's Game 6-4 But Take Round By 13-10 Count

Jackie Kane's St. Dunstan's University hockey squad last night captured the New Brunswick P. E. I. Intercollegiate hockey crown and with it the right to enter the finals for the Maritime title which although defeated 6-4 by St. Thomas team in the second game of the series they took the round 13-10, the result of their 9-4 victory at Chatham a week ago.

But it was a close call for the team that entered the game as heavy favorites to add to their five goal total. In the first period they outshot the visitors 2-1 after St. Thomas had scored the opening goal to increase their goal margin to six counters but halfway through the middle session the St. Thomas team suddenly sprang to life.

They opened the throttle wide to take the play away from the Saints, snapped in two counters to take a 2-2 lead by the end of the period and then kept up the pressure just after the whistle sent them into action for the third and final session. In less than two minutes the visitors had shot another brace of tallies and before the nine minute mark had reached ahead a third to reduce the Saints' margin to one goal.

Sensing victory the visiting team kept hammering away at the unflinching Saints but couldn't break through for the round-winning goal. Then like a bolt out of the blue the Saint's first line of Mahar, Blanchard and McIsaac, powerless all night, suddenly hit their real skating form. Twice in a row they raced in close only to be turned back, but on the third time they struck and did it. Mahar raced in behind the net and as the entire team moved up Rodgers took the pass to slam the rubber home. Just 13 seconds later Mahar and Blanchard again carried deep into Saints territory. They lost the disc momentarily but Mahar recovered and this time Method, O'Neil, Collins, Duroche, Subis, Lavolette, Miller, Breau.

Both teams elected to play it wide open from the start with Joe Mahar racing in in the first few seconds only to shoot over the net. St. Thomas came surging back in three quarters and Method and Mahar drawing a penalty the visitors applied more pressure but it was no dice. But St. Thomas finally broke through as Mahar, Rodgers and McIsaac, snapped Hay's rebound between the posts to give his team a 2-0 lead. But it was shortlived. Just 12 seconds later Thibault pushed back in three quarters and Method scored square matters at 1-1. For the next six minutes both teams played scoreless hockey but St. Thomas scored enough chances to win the game. Mahar and McIsaac, who had been doubling figures at 17:38 however Thibault and McDougall, carrying the brunt of the Saint's attack, gave their team a 2-1 lead with McDougall tapping Thibault's rebound in to complete the scoring for the period.

For the first ten minutes of the second period it was dull, listless hockey as the two squads checked and re-checked with neither team having a real good scoring chance, but at the half-way mark St. Thomas, with the effects of their long trip apparently wearing off, started speeding matters up; they fired home the tying goal at 10:46 when Jenkins, charged defenceman on a beautiful bit of stickhandling worked right in to McKinnon's doorstep before shooting the disc home. Keeping up the offensive they hammered the Saints in and finally went into the lead as McKinnon, their other defenceman, shared the disc about thirty-five feet out to pick the open corner of the net with a waist high drive that the Saint's goalie never made a move on. Juvenile Kinsmen came through in the clutch Monday night and will now advance against Summerside Kinsmen, present defending Maritime champions for the Island title and the series which starts at Summerside tonight should be one of the highlights of the season.

Twice already this year Bill Boy's team have taken the measure of the western crew in their first year in organized hockey. Given little chance against the experienced Kinsmen club the squad came along remarkably well during the regular league and in the playdowns forced the Kinsmen to four games before conceding defeat and they were defeated by the slimmest of margins.

In fact with less than ten minutes to go in the final game it appeared as if they were going to spring the biggest upset of the season; that they failed wasn't through the want of trying but they just didn't have the polish to offset the Kinsmen's late lead.

Ables were not by any means of thinking the smoothest team in the league but they certainly were one of the most courageous. They kept digging in continually even when trailing and their method of play very nearly brought results. But there is another season coming up and with most of them still eligible to juvenile ranks and with some polish added (the hockey ability is there) they should have to be strongly reckoned with before next season's playoff time rolls around.

Visit of Dalhousie Tigers here next Friday night for their exhibition match against Prince of Wales Welshmen has caused an added stir in hockey circles. It has been a long time since a Dalhousie team made an appearance here and their coming game against the local college lads should assure a packed house for the encounter that will be preceded by speed skating races.

Truro Bearcats rebounded right back into the thick of the fight for the Maritime Big Four hockey title when they soundly whipped Moncton Hawks 4-2 and by so doing go back to Truro and home ice on even footing with the powerful band of Moncton puck chasers. And it could be quite possible that the Bearcats always tougher on home ice could end the series right there.

Big Bud McEachern is likely the toast of all Truro today. His two goals played most important part in the outcome and his Island followers were keenly delighted when the news was flashed. Bud has been playing a wack of a game for the 'Cats the past month or so and when the big winger is right he is a really hard player to stop, probably the Hawks will testify to today.
