St. Anthony's Credit Union Annual Meeting

—One of the big events of the surrounding districts of St. Anthony's Credit Union was their Annual Meeting held on Tuesday night, October 18th. A well-attended hall of members and visitors were present.

The meeting was called to order with the singing of O'Canada. The first order of business was the roll call followed by the minutes of the last annual meeting. The President, Mr. Melvin Bridges gave the report of the Directors. He stated that regular meetings were held, and a number of special meetings, he also mentioned the annual picnic held at Maxfield's Shores on July 1st, and the annual dinner for all the officers both being a great success. His report was adopted on motion, of Dennis Peters, seconded by Joseph B. Arsenault.

Mr. C.J. Gallant, Treasurer, gave the financial report. The report showed a savings of over \$20,000 in share capital, with 206 members. Mr. Gallant stated that the Credit Union did very well, but generally speaking it has not grown or developed as it might have if our members had given full support. We hold savings of over twenty thousand dollars, but this could have been easily forty thousand if we had all saved to the best of our ability, and thus made forty thousand available to our members to satisfy their credit requirements. A great future is in sight for our Credit Union, we are only beginning," quoted Mr. Gallant. His report was adopted on motion of William Shields seconded by Leo Arsenault.

Mr. Peter Gallant reported for the Supervisory Committee, he stated that \$10,446.90 had been loaned during the year, one rule that the Credit Committee would stress on is that no loan be made unless borrower and co-maker are both present. The adoption of the report was moved by Philip Gallant seconded by Dennis Peters.

Rev. M.J. Rooney reported for the service of Cuna Insurance. He explained the manner in which the books were audited during the period of three months, he stressed the service of Cuna Insurance, the report was adopted on motion of Philip Gallant seconded by Dorice Gallant.

The election of officers was the next order of business. The new directors elected are Messrs. Dorice Gallant, Lawrence Peters, and Mrs. Robert Peters. Credit Committee, Mr. Arthur Richard, Supervisory Committee, Mr. Gilbert Gaudet. Mrs. Thomas Duncau.
