This is one of the most striking exhibits on the main floor. It represents a tastefully decorated room—the wall hung with a handsome design in new wall paper, rugs on the floor, delicate lace curtains and portieres artistically draped here and there.

Within the room are shown many handsome new designs in wall paper produced by the Watson Foster Co. of Montreal, for whom Moore & McLeod are selling agents. The Watson Foster Co. are the largest makers of wall paper in Canada—producing more than two thirds of Canada's total output of wall paper.

This well known hardware firm have a magnificent display of stoves opposite the main entrance. Among the most noticeable is the famous McClary Kootenay kitchen Range which is much admired. There is also the Kitchener Range also an excellent stove. Another is the Model Grade made by the New Burrell Johnson Co. and with the fine assortment of hall stoves etc, an admirable selection can be made.

**HASZARD & MOORE.**

Have a fine display in fine printing and relief work. On exhibition are copies of diplomas, addresses, wedding and visiting cards, monograms, etc. The booth is trimmed in white and red with autumn leaves and is very tasteful. The firm are distributing free blotters to all who pass the booth.

**A HORNE & CO.**

Have as in previous years a varied and comprehensive display of pianos, organs and sewing machines. They point with especial pride to two magnificent pianos one a Newcombe and the other a Mendelssohn. The Newcombe is a beautiful instrument—one of the finest that can be procured—and is finished in walnut. The Mendelssohn is of rosewood—and though slightly inferior to the other would form a beautiful ornament to any home. The New Home ball bearing sewing machine with automatic disappearing head is an especial attraction to the ladies. It is said to be one of the finest machines manufactured. The firm are to be congratulated upon the excellence of their showing and the attention it is attracting.

**REID'S TRYON WOOLEN MILLS.**

Have their stand near the east entrance. The motto "Home made goods for home trade" "Tryon Tweeds are good tweeds" and "Encourage home industry" are prominently displayed. The exhibits include all the lines manufactured and embraces homespun, tweed, yarns, ready made suits etc.

During the past two years the firm reports great advances in sales of their goods which stand high in the estimation of island buyers. A specialty is the working men's pants which are well suited for rough and tear work on the farm. The display affords an excellent opportunity of judging what the Province can produce in the manufacture of cloth and compares very favorably with that of foreign importation.

**THE CHARLOTTETOWN SOAP WORKS.**

This well known manufactory is to the front as usual with an excellent assortment of their popular soaps. The Royal Oak is prominently displayed and immense cakes cap the pyramid. Their potash also occupies a prominent place. The Messrs. Laphorne have earned an excellent reputation and it is pleasing to learn of the increasing sales of their factory's products.

**JAMES TAIT, JR.**

Mr. Tait, the popular florist, has given to visitors a most interesting as well as instructive display. To the florist as well as all who love flowers the exhibit of Mr. Tait is most attractive. The back ground of the booth situated upstairs is white forming a pretty contrast to the green plants, principally ferns and palms which Mr. Tait shows. Prominent is the Pierson fern, the greatest novelty in plants for many years and the winner of six gold medals and seven silver medals in America at horticultural shows. He has also the Norfolk Island pine, among the first of the kind brought to the Island. This is to be found in the centre of

the table. Mr. Tait had intended making a showing of all kinds of winter flowering bulbs but owing to their late arrival it was impossible to do so. He will however shortly have a full line in stock at his Brighton hot house.

**R. E. MUTCH & CO.**

Have their booth at the east entrance to the building. There may be found the popular Top Draught Queen Heater. This stove though only two years in use has had a sale of over thirty thousand in that time. Its popularity throughout Canada is the same as its popularity throughout P. E. Island and all who use it are satisfied of its merits.

**GEORGE E. HUGHES.**

Anjoining in the south east corner is the Apothecaries Hall exhibit. Here are to be found immense pyramids of Hughes' popular remedies, Herb Food, Cough Mixtures, Horse Liniment, Stain Destroyer, etc. The booth is prettily decorated with flags and spruce which add much to its tasteful appearance.

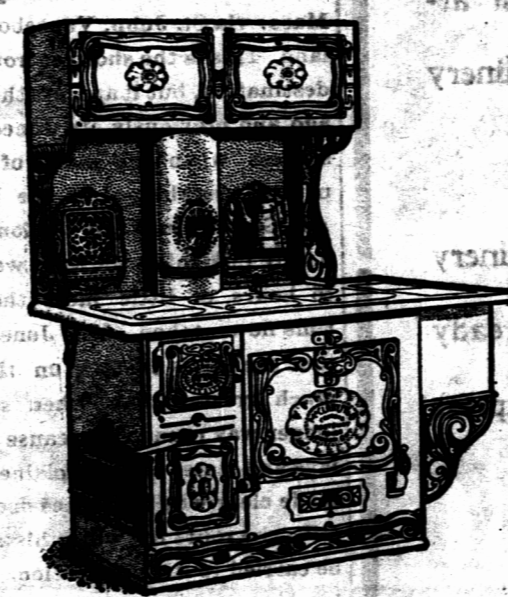

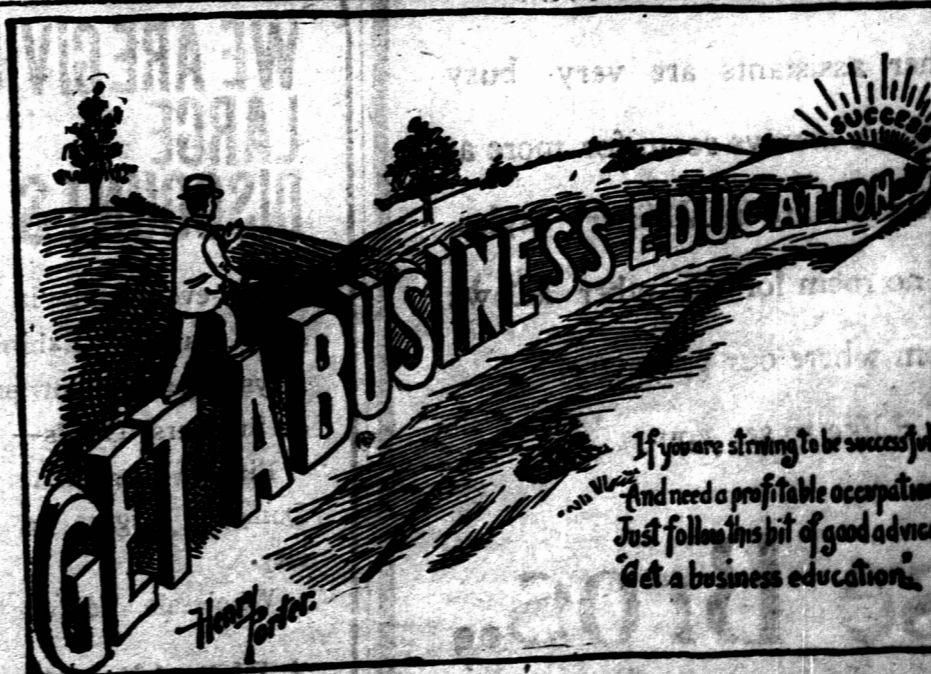
