well up there with his horses. Doctor Wilson, Bonnie Spruce and Dolly Direct. I think he did particularly well with Doctor Wilson considering the tough company he was racing in. He sold him and has also traded Bonnie Spruce and Dolly Direct. You will notice that he is racing a horse called Brownie Grattan which he thinks is a real good horse, young and sound with a terrific burst of speed. Last summer he changed hands at \$1,400, but did not get along well with the new owners. He was started six times at Dufferin track this fall and did not get any place. Then Roy took him in trade. His first two starts he was no good but in the third start he headed a high-class field of horses. In the next start he got into a mixup, five of them went down in a heap. Roy had a slight chaff and a broken silky shaft went through the calf of his leg. He has three weeks in hospital and has not been driving since. Dr. Fowler of New York has been handling Brownie for him and doing pretty well.

"Roy got another horse in trade called Larry Harvester by Lee Harvester. He is eligible to the thirty class and was miles in 2.12 last summer but is erratic. Roy thinks he can straighten him out and that he will be a whale of a horse this summer. Roy seems to have a knack with bad actors. He is kind to them and does not get excited and that means a lot. I have an idea that he will either race in Ontario this summer or in the U.S.A., perhaps in Foxboro. I understand that Worrell Lewis will leave here early in the spring with five horses, three of P. J. Cadogan and two others and will train on the Island. Later on he will take in the night races at Foxboro. The horses he expects to take are Time Counts 2.06 3/5, Carl Frisco 2.03 and Prodigal Vic 2.05 1/4, also a couple of others." I am sure all our readers, particularly the older ones, will be glad to hear from Mr. Oland again.

Ralph S. Donahue, Sunny Brae, Moncton, has had a great deal of pleasure with the pacer Symbol S. Harry 2.09 1/2 that raced so well for Chester Smith a couple of seasons ago. Symbol Harry goes free-legged, has nice manners and is easy to drive. We understand that Mr. Donahue intends selling him and this will give somebody a good opportunity to pick up a racing prospect.

Leading trotters and pacers in the United States and Canada today trace to horses that were at one time considered of little value. William L., the sire of Axtell from which the Axworthy family is descended, was one of the most worthless looking stallions in Kentucky. Pilot Medium, a grey horse that was injured as a colt and ordered destroyed, was the sire of Peter the Great 2.07 1/4, and May King, the sire of Bingen 2.06 1/4 had nothing to recommend him as a sire except his pedigree.

The path which led to Bingen's success as a sire is interesting. In the fall of 1894 George W. Leavitt was in Lexington, Kentucky, looking for racing material. One evening he heard of a yearling that had trotted a quarter in 35 seconds. Finding that it was by a horse called May King he asked local parties in regard to him and was told that he was of no account. When he learned that the owner wanted \$800 for the colt the smartest horseman said they would not give \$8.00 for a May King colt if he trotted a quarter in thirty seconds. Leavitt looked up the colt and bought him, shipping him to New England where he sold the following September for \$8,000.00 and the week after the sale an offer of \$25,000 was turned down. Bingen was the sire of Uhan 1.58, world's champion trotter until dethroned by Peter Manning 1.56 1/2, who was subsequently succeeded by Greyhound 1.55 1/4, the present champion whose breeding is a combination of Axtell and Pilot Medium. Of course the three horses mentioned that were thought to be of no account all had good breeding on both sides of their pedigree and the study of these is one of the most inter-

TORONTO, Feb. 6.—(CP)—New York Rangers of the National Hockey League announced today they have traded forward Grant Warwick to Boston Bruins for centre Billy Taylor and an unnamed player who will join the Rangers at the start of the next season.

The deal, concluded this afternoon, is effective immediately. Warwick joins the Bruins in time to play with them Sunday night against the Red Wings at Detroit. Taylor comes to the Rangers from his home at Oshawa, Ont., where he has spent the last few days. The New Yorkers will play Toronto Maple Leafs here tomorrow night.

A Rangers spokesman said the club expects that when Taylor rounded into playing form he will provide attacking strength. Bruins hope that Warwick will furnish the punch they need to get into the N. H. L. play-offs.

A native of Regina, Warwick has been with the Rangers since 1941-42. Taylor has been in the N. H. L. since 1939-40 with Toronto, Detroit and Boston.

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
