Mr. Baird of the Nappan Experimental Station thought hay in Eastern Canada was cut a month and a half too late. Clover should be cut now, when in blossom and he suggested mowing clover to hogs which would cut down the cost of mill feeds.

F. W. Walsh of the Agricultural Department of the C. N. R., speaking on economic production said farmers could not grow too many root crops. No plant was better adapted to this than the Maritimes he said. He also approved of Mr. Baird's suggestion - the early cutting of hay.

Mr. Baird also gave interesting figures on the cost of production at the experimental farm at Nappan and related to a sample of Western oats which he had secured and sent to the seed branch where it was found to contain 60 percent wild oats. These western oats cost more money than our own. He could not understand why the farmers did not produce their turnip seed. Home grown seed would produce better results than the commercial as sometimes the latter was five or six years old and only about 60 percent would germinate.

16TH ANNUAL MEETING OF BIBLE SOCIETY

The report of the District Secretary for P. E. I. & N. B. Rev. J. Murchison, was next presented 877 Bibles, 596 testaments and 3,598 portions of Scripture were distributed from the Bible House in St. John during the year, 12,633 portions in 32 languages being given away at the port of St. John.

Mr. T. R. Millman, the Society's collector for N. E. and P. E. I. gave a short report showing that one of the strongest and most important factors is that of co-operation if the work is to be carried on successfully.

Mrs. Ewen McKinnon of Charlottetown, sang the Beautiful Garden of Prayer very sweetly. The following resolution was brought forward from the executive meeting and passed: "Resolved, that the Prince Edward Island branch of the Canadian Bible Society in annual session approve of the change of name and that the name be the British and Foreign Bible Society in Canada and Newfoundland."

Rev. Dr. Wolfe of Acadia University, Wolfville, was then introduced by the Chairman. He brought greetings from the Nova Scotia Auxiliary. The Dr. spoke of the great contribution the English speaking people have made to the world in placing the Bible so freely in the hands of the people of all lands. If the Bible is to become influential, the people must be able to read it in the lives of Christians; it must be translated into human experience.

Rev. Dr. Ramsay of Charlottetown, followed in an address based on the text "The Seed is the Word." He showed the absolute importance of seed sowing both in the natural and spiritual world. Good crops are the result of good sowing. Christian Uganda is the harvest from the faithful sowing of the word of God in Africa. Spreading the Bible through the world is just giving God a chance to work.

At the close of the meeting the visitors were carried off to the homes of the people where wonderful hospitality was dispensed. The evening session opened at 8 o'clock with the President in the chair. Rev. Quincy McDowell, Caledonia read the scripture portions and Rev. Archie Murchison led in prayer. The report of the nominating committee resulted in the election of the following officers: Patron - His Honour Lieut.-Governor, President, Rev. H. D. Raymond, M. A.

Before presenting his report of the year's work the President, Rev. H. D. Raymond, read a letter of greeting from the General Secretary for Canada, Rev. J. B. Armour, showing appreciation of the loyalty and work of the P. E. I. Auxiliary. He also conveyed messages from a number of members who were unable to be present. He drew attention to the fact that all publications of the Society can be had at almost cost price from the Depository, Mr. Isaac C. (Charlottetown). Mr. Raymond said that this year has been the greatest in the history of the Society. In the last twenty-five years, twenty-five million more copies of the Bible were circulated than in the preceding hundred years. He stressed the work of the distribution of the Scriptures at the ports and the follow-up work of the collectors in the Western Provinces. 1929 marks the completion of the fifth quarter century of the work of the parent society, the British and Foreign Bible Society and the twenty-fifth year of the Canadian Auxiliary.

The treasurer, Dr. H. D. Johnson, gave his report as follows. Receipts \$4765.88 Disbursements 3932.24 Balance in Hand \$5051.27 He stated that 48 out of 54 branches had contributed during the year and it is desirous that all returns for the Thank-Offering to be handed in soon.
