BRITISH PARLIAMENT

MET TUESDAY UNDER MOST UNIQUE CONDITIONS

Great Change in Make Up of Commons—Members Grouped
in Seven Factions and Balfour May Be Deposed—Irish
to Try Opportunity for Furthering Their Cause—
Tariff Issue the Main One.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—On Tuesday, February 2, King Edward will open in full state what promises to be one of the most interesting and important sessions in the history of the British Parliament. No government of recent times has ever faced the legislature under such altered conditions. Since parliament adjourned in June last, not only has the cabinet been entirely re-constructed, but the party lines have been completely broken.

SEVEN FACTIONS IN THE HOUSE.

Seven distinct factions will take seats in the House of Commons Tuesday, namely: the followers of Premier Balfour, who favor a policy of tariff retaliation, but who object to protection; the Chamberlain party, who insist that protection is necessary to the unity of the empire; the out-and-out free traders who are opposed to any tinkering with the fiscal system; the foregoing were all formerly known as Unionists. The Liberals, who were free traders, are split up into two different factions, one following Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman and insisting on home rule, and the other regarding Lord Rosebery as their logical leader and refusing to make home rule a plank of their platform.

The labor party completes the triple division of the liberal free-trade ranks. John Redmond and the Irish party make the seventh faction. In view of this complex state of affairs, largely due to events since parliament last met, the most astute politicians frankly confess themselves to be at sea. So many cabinet ministers, including Joseph Chamberlain, Charles T. Ritchie and Lord Geo. Hamilton, will be present from their accustomed places that the oldest parliamentary hands will scarcely be able to distinguish between the supporters and the opponents of the government on the fiscal question. The Duke of Devonshire, Lord Asbury, Mr. Goschen, Sir John Gorst, Lord George Hamilton, Lord Hugh Cecil, Winston Spencer, W. Churchill and many others identified with the present party in power will be Mr. Balfour's most bitter oppo-

nents the moment the fiscal question is raised.

FISCAL DEBATE AT ONCE.

That will come quickly, for John Morley intends introducing an amendment to the king's speech on this point. It is possible, though hardly probable, that Mr. Morley may turn out the government. The debate is likely to take several days. Strenuous efforts are now making to get the free trade unionist members in unity to abstain from voting, but to openly join the Liberal forces in the opposition. However, if this is accomplished and the Duke of Devonshire's followers make common cause with the Liberals, who regard Lord Rosebery as their leader, it would not constitute a solution of the differences of opinion which exist between Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman and the Liberal ex-premier.

The best informed persons say that even in the event of a temporary coalition of all the free trade forces, the Irish party has the deciding vote and all indications point to John Redmond keeping Mr. Balfour in power. But as Mr. Redmond does not make definite pledges, the Irish party throughout the situation is likely to be an uncertain factor. That will heighten the interest and any day may make it possible for Mr. Balfour to be deposed.

Besides the amendments of Messrs. Morley and Redmond, the government will be attacked on the report of the war commission. This will be taken up by William S. Robson, Liberal, denouncing the government's recent educational act.

A few months ago these topics would have attracted intense interest and might have driven the government into a corner. Now they are almost forgotten in the question of the hour—free trade versus protection. Many members of the House of Commons scarcely know their own mind as yet on the vital topic and several are undecided as to which side of the house they sit when the king will convene parliament next Tuesday.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Captain George A. Arms, U. S. A. retiree, has addressed a letter to the president charging unjust treatment at the hands of the military authorities. He asserts that important documents bearing on his record have mysteriously disappeared from the office of the adjutant general.

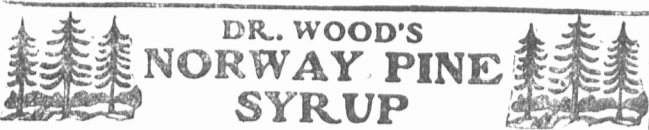
