GERMANS HAVE GOT STORY MIXED.

BERLIN, Aug. 29.—Wireless to Sayville—Passengers who arrived at Amsterdam yesterday afternoon on the Holland-American steamship Ryndam, brought a report that a British transport carrying 2,000 Canadian troops was torpedoed on August 15 off the Scilly Islands. It is said that about 1,000 were saved.

The Ryndam arrived at Rotterdam August 2nd, and has since sailed on her return voyage from New York. The trip from Rotterdam to Amsterdam requires only a few hours, so it is probable that the Ryndam's passengers who proceeded to Amsterdam reached there August 22nd or 23rd. It is possible, however, that the name of the steamer, or the date of the passengers' arrival at Amsterdam, had been confused in transmission of the wireless message from Berlin.

OTTAWA, Aug. 29.—The military authorities issued the following official statement regarding the above report: "Between the 31st of July and 24th of August only two troops with more than three hundred troops on board have been despatched from Canada, and they have both arrived safely at their destinations. Moreover, every troopship bearing Canadian troops which was at sea on August 15th, has arrived safely at its destination. There is no Canadian troopship overdue, and if the story coming via Sayville has any basis of truth it must refer to the torpedoing of the Canadian Northern steamer Royal Edward in the Aegean Sea, the report of which event reached Canada August 17."

TRAVELLERS MUST USE PAPER MONEY

PARIS, Aug. 29.—All travellers leaving France hereafter will be required to declare the amount of funds in coin in his possession. If more than fifty francs (10) he will be compelled to exchange the excess for paper money, under a decree issued today by the Finance Minister Ribot.

This action resulted from an investigation of the scarcity of silver coin, particularly in the frontier regions. It was ascertained that coins in circulation were being collected systematically for export. Even coppers and nickels were sought and exchanged at a premium.

It has been suggested unofficially that for the purpose of preventing hoarding during the war the government should announce its intention of issuing a new series of coins after the conclusion of peace demonetizing those now in circulation.

KIPLING SINGS PRAISES OF THE FRENCH PEOPLE.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Following are extracts from a private letter from Rudyard Kipling, who has been visiting the French front:

"I thought I realized something of what was done in France. I see I am now only beginning to understand what France is doing. France is not merely fighting this war. She is living it—living it with gaiety and a high heart that does not for a second hide the cold, deadly earnestness and tenacity of her purpose. I can testify that they bear themselves, men and women equally, resolute, without pride or self pity.

"We had tea the other day in a town which the Bosches shelled because it is full of women and children, and has a fine old church. The cellars of the house were a hospital but no one around that cheery table upstairs suggested or even hinted at the perpetual strain under which they live.

"So far as I can see, there is not a single individual from one end of France to the other who is not colored, guided and soaked through by their strong determination.
