MINERALS IN HOG FEEDING

If properly fed a young pig will increase its weight one hundred times in six months, or from about two pounds at birth to about two hundred pounds at six months old. To produce this very rapid growth all the necessary elements, including minerals, must be provided. If minerals are lacking in the ration, the pigs become unthrifty in condition and growth is much slower. Spring pigs secure the necessary minerals largely from pastures and from eating the freshly rooted soil. Minerals from these sources are not available for fall litters which are fed mainly in dry lots and pens, and an adequate mineral ration should be provided.

A simple mineral mixture which has been used for a number of years at the Dominion Experimental Station, Lacombe, Alberta, consists of 76 pounds of slack coal, 20 pounds of salt, 3 pounds of air-slacked lime or ground limestone, and one pound of sulphur. The mixture is fed in boxes or in separate compartments of the self-feeder to which the pigs have free access.—Dominion Dept. of Agriculture.

my desk while my mind was still teeming with them and get them down on paper.

One of the most interesting things I learned was that some of the fine old Waterford patterns of crystalware so highly prized in the middle of the Eighteenth Century are now being reproduced in Canada. The originals of these are rare museum pieces. One Waterford design, as you may know, is characterized by alternating vertical panels, every other panel being finely cut like a cross-stitch—with various ornate designs at the top to suit the use of the piece. "Marlboro" is known by a wide cut band around the base of each piece with a line of "punctures" (shallow cut-out ovals), each one separated by three fine vertical lines—a most delicate pattern.

While we are on the subject of patterns the "Colonial" should have its space. The colonial design in crystalware is of the simplest—yet since it is made of the most flawless of crystal and requires such expert workmanship to execute it is known and appreciated by ladies of fastidious and cultured taste, as perfect. It is characterized by a wide bulge in the stem of the stemware pieces and is cut so that the bottom of the bowl has an octagonal shape. Very simple and very effective and the most perfect of crystalware.

The mirror plaque is back in favour again. I said "Oh, I remember when my mother used one of those under her table flowers." My guide answered "Yes, but I'll bet it had little feet." Sure enough it had. The new ones as you probably have noticed, are flat with a felt back and sometimes lily bowls and candle sticks are made to complete a set of four pieces for centre table decorations and certainly I coveted one of them.

Unless you have some rare heirlooms in silver for a centerpiece, these decorative glass pieces cannot be excelled for pure brilliance and beauty for table arrangement.

My breath was "fair taken away" with the long list of stemware that is made to suit different tastes (in both senses of the word) liquor, sherry, port, claret, water goblet, dessert sherbet, champagne sherbet—not that anyone ever uses all of them at once—or even owns all of them, but nevertheless there they are—all the graduated sizes for your own choice.

In placing these at table covers, the water goblet is set just to the right of the tips of the knife or knives and other beverage glassware to the right of it.

Most every individual piece that we think of in terms of silverware may be had in glass: jugs for instance, come in frog, tankard and Georgian shapes—I enjoy just writing those names. Butter plates are octagonal and quite shallow. By the way the old butter tubs—and covered butter dishes are definitely "out." Crystal candle sticks and fruit and flower bowls are gaining favor over the more costly silverware as decorative table pieces.
