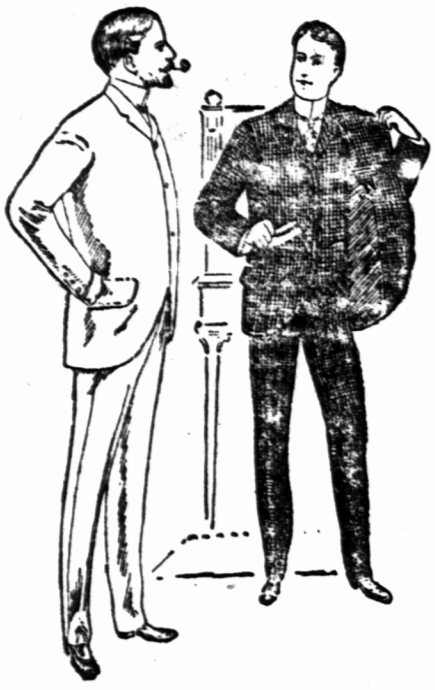

Latest from Summerside and Prince County

POTATOES have dropped again to 38c in Summerside.

W. H. McKie, Moncton, was a passenger to Summerside by the Northumberland Saturday night.

Six horses were shipped by the Northumberland on Saturday five of which belonged to A. Clow, North Wiltshire.

THE meeting of Saint Georges Lodge S. O. E. which was to have been held tonight, has been postponed until Wednesday night next.

THERE were 35 barrels of oysters among the shipments by the Northumberland on Saturday. The first shipment of oysters this season was made on the previous day when eight barrels went forward.

The steamer Campana on her first trip from Montreal this season brought the largest freight yet carried by that steamer to this port. She sailed at five o'clock Saturday morning for Charlottetown.

An adjourned meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held Saturday evening at which there was a large attendance of representative business men. It was decided to organize a Steamship Company and a Committee was appointed to solicit stock and make preliminary arrangements. A meeting of the shareholders will be held in a few days to arrange details.

THE I.O.O.F. attended Divine Service in the Methodist Church yesterday morning which was also attended by a large congregation. The sermon for the occasion was preached by Rev. Neil McLaughlin. Miss Comstock sang two solos, and the choir rendered special music. The parade of the Order to and from the church consisted of thirty members headed by the Summerside Cornet Band.

The Summerside Yacht Club will hold their first club event on Victoria Day, May 25. Sailing races are for club boats only. On this day a new feature is to be introduced for this season in the way of rowing races. For this event they will have two races, one to be composed of two-oared working boats, the other for double skulls. Suitable prizes will be given in all events.

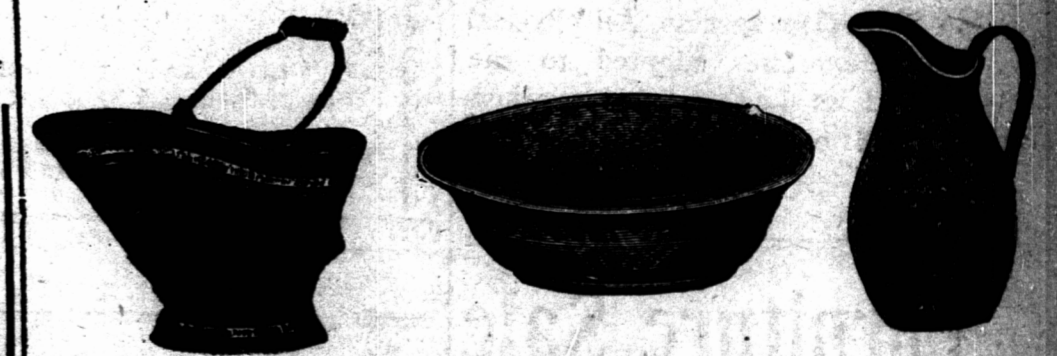
