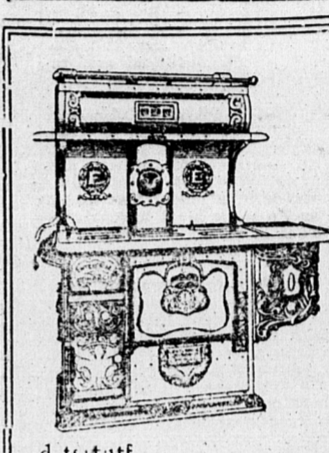

BOGUS PASSES ON THE INTERCOLONIAL.

OTTAWA, Feb. 22—A return brought down in the House yesterday gives a report by G. A. Bell, respecting his investigation in the fraudulent use of passes on the Intercolonial Railway.

Mr. Bell, whose report is dated in the current month, states that suspicion was first aroused through passes being used of a higher number than the official series. Inquiry was instituted and the investigator says that it became evident that a certain number of unfinished passes had come into the possession of some persons who were not authorized to use them. Suspicion pointed to a clerk in the employ of the Intercolonial Railway who has since left the country.

As most of the fraudulent passes were over-written, that is the passes were issued to a destination beyond which the users intended to leave the train, the greater number were not taken up. The form has since been changed and steps taken for closer scrutiny by conductors, while a better system of control and audit has been put in force at Moncton.

CAPITALS LOSE THEIR FIRST HOCKEY MATCH

MONTREAL, Feb. 22—Seven thousand people attended the hockey match on Saturday night and witnessed the Capitals lose the first game of the season in the National Hockey League to the Wanderers. The two teams are now even in the championship race.

MONCTON COUNCIL WILLING TO PART WITH LIGHTING PLANT

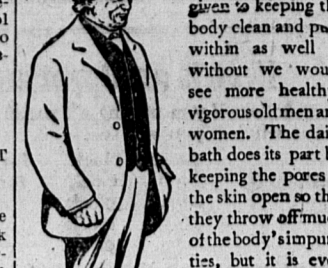
MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 22—The city council tonight decided to ask for legislation giving them authority to consider and enter into an agreement with the Moncton Street Railway Company to lease or sell the city lighting plant. A rider is attached to the legislation making it imperative to submit the agreement to a plebiscite before the terms can be agreed to.

The question of extending the franchise in accordance with the wishes of the Trades and Labor union, was also considered. Labor men agreed to accept as basis for qualification for voting a payment of \$1000 rental and a poll tax. A petition from citizens against franchise was submitted to the council and the question was referred back to a special committee for further consideration.
