Enjoyable Visit To Western Canada

The Messrs. J. Reagh and A. Parker Horne of Winsloe returned Friday evening from a three month visit to the Canadian West. They spent two days in Montreal and four days in Winnipeg on their way West. In Winnipeg they were interested in the Grain Exchange and in the process followed in the sale of Western wheat. Here also they visited the recently opened new plant of the Harris Abattoir where they killed on an average between four and five hundred cattle a day, or an average of one every minute. The buildings are situated near the Union Stock yards. The cattle, from all over the West are shipped to the stock yards ready for slaughter. From the stock yards they are driven up a long stairway to the top storey, the seventh, where they are killed. Every process from the living to the delivery of the meat is in the hands of a specialist each of whom does one particular thing and nothing else. The whole plant is under government inspection. The principal output of the plant is cattle and hogs, the latter numbering from 1,000 to 1,200 a day. In all the slaughtering every particle of every animal is utilized. The guide who showed them through the plant explained to them the hair of the cattle and hogs is dried and sold for plastering, the bones ground for poultry feed, the blood and offal turned into fertilizer. The guide humorously remarked that not a hair was wasted. They even preserved the squeal of the hog and sold it as static to the radio people. This will explain the unearthly howls occasionally heard and not understood by the radio fans. Here also they visited the largest stores, warehouses and stables, especially the establishment of the T. Eaton Company. This company uses about 200 autos and 185 horses in their delivery service.

From Winnipeg they went to Regina where they spent a week. They attended the opening of the Provincial parliament and were shown the whole building from the basement to the dome. The C. N. R. Broadcasting station was one of the most interesting sights in the city. Their next stop was at Saskatoon where they spent some time at the Agricultural College, saw the different classes at work, including demonstrations in judging horses, cattle, etc. all of which appealed especially to them as this was in line with their own activities during the year. Here they attended a Grain Growers Convention an amalgamation of the Grain Growers and Wheat Pool upon which the Western farmers depend so much for the sale of their products. The next visit was at Strassburg, where they visited relatives and met many Islanders who have done well in the last few years. Throughout the whole visit they enjoyed wonderfully fine weather, saw very little snow in the West and drove in automobiles up to the day they left. The oldest inhabitants declared it was the mildest winter the West had experienced in their time. At Strassburg they bought two carloads of horses, through a former Islander, Mr. Ambrose Coles who is known all over the West as one of the best farmers and roadmakers in the West. These animals are now on their farm at Winsloe where they are being admired by visitors.

The journey home was uneventful, occupying nine days in all. The Messrs Horne are greatly pleased by their Western visit, but are quite satisfied that this province offers as many inducements and more certainty to farmers than any part of the West which they visited.

The ice harvest is being gathered in. Large quantities are being stored by the farmers, this is the first sign of Spring that we have seen.
