N. B. HORSEMEN RETURN FROM "OLD GLORY"

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Dec. 8.—James W. Gallagher and Mr. H. M. De Witt, who slipped home a week ago, returned home yesterday. They attended the Old Glory sale in New York, visited other noted horse centres, including Newark, N. J., Hartford, Conn. and Greenfield, Mass. At the Old Glory sale 595 horses were sold, and speaking of the demand for best ones, Mr. Gallagher said that good horses brought good prices and poor horses could not be sold. He saw one horse, formerly a noted speed king, sell for \$15. The Woodstock men were much impressed by some of the free-for-all representatives and had in view the purchase of a horse, with a mark of two minutes. It was soon discovered that the horse could not be handled and after bidding \$4,460 Mr. DeWitt withdrew. La Paloma, 2:01.4, a very handsome bay mare, sold for \$6,700. Justus Brooke, a trotter, brought \$18,000 and will go to Walnut Hill Farm.

CANADIENS TAKE HARD GAME FROM BRUINS 4-3

Joliat, Star Forward Of the "Frenchmen" Covered Himself With Glory, Scoring Three Out of Four Goals—Bruins Played Spectacular Hockey And Forced Visitors To The Limit.

(Special to The Guardian) BOSTON, Dec. 8.—Aurel Joliat, demure young left winger on the Canadiens lineup last night played havoc with Art Ross' Bruins in his first appearance in the Boston Arena, scoring the winning 4 to 3 goal in the final tussle of what was conceded to be the fastest and most spectacular game of hockey ever played in the "Hub" city.

From the opening gong till the final whistle there was not a dull moment. Boston hit a hard pace in the opening period, maintaining it throughout the second, with the help of the scintillating and brilliant Fowler in the nets, who played a star game over the whole stretch. Skinner on the front line for Boston, also turned in an effective game; he was the sore thorn in the Canucks' sides all night. But to young Joliat of the Canadiens goes the laurel wreath and to him the big margin of victory. He not only scored the big end of the counts, but worked the Boston defence overtime in every period—his end-to-end rushes were daz-

THEY MAKE NO BONES ABOUT IT

The attention of the Canadian hockey officials is called to the following:
BOSTON, December 8.—Concluding an editorial on professional hockey, the Boston Herald says complacently: "The Canadiens are still the great masters, but the gap between them and the Americans is closing steadily. Incidentally, the rewards for playing are so much greater here than elsewhere that in time we shall have the best hockey in the world as we have the best singers."

Heading between the lines there cannot be ignored the implied conviction that the United States sporting men expect to take control of Canada's great winter sport shortly.

DANDURAND RESPECTS OTTAWAS

Leo Dandurand, the boy manager of Canadiens, is one who has a vast respect for Ottawas. Speaking recently, he paid tribute to the Ottawa team. In his opinion they have been the cornerstone of the edifice of professional hockey. While he naturally considers his present team is an unbeatable combination, he figures that Ottawas are so successful that they are a constant menace to the supremacy of Canadiens. In a fanning bee recently, he declared he considered Frank Nighbor one of the greatest players that has ever laced on a skate. "My players have often told me that he is an almost insurmountable barrier to pass when going right. Anyone who thinks that Ottawas are out of the race because of a few changes or early defeats, is making a grievous error." Leo is very proud of the fact that Canadiens have such a big following here. The fact that so many Ottawa boys are on the team is responsible. Leo has a magnetic personality, and the ability to make and hold friendships. While Ottawa fans have to pull against him and his team, they have come to have a vast respect for his tactical ability and his "bonhomie," which have made him an arresting personality in the sport world.

Another castle of dreams came tumbling down when Quintin Romero Rejas took the decision from Jack Renault, the sometime Montreal copper, at Boston. Renault will now pause a while on his laborious way to the top, and await another day before resuming his painful march to within striking distance of Dempsey.
