Island Boy Under The Southern Cross Word has been received from Arthur MacLeod, who is on board the Canadian Steamship "Canadian Highlander," of the arrival of the ship at Auckland, New Zealand, en route to Australia. Art reports a good time with many interesting features of the trip, calling at Colon, Panama Canal, and other South American ports. A real sea trip of 20 days, without seeing land or sighting a ship. Art went aboard as deck boy, but owing to the illness of one of the Cadets, has taken his place and has had the experience of ship steering, log reading, combined with the regular routine of ship painting, scouring and scraping. While engaged with one of the Cadets painting the bow of the ship, while in port at Wellington, New Zealand, the boy entered into the role of accidental upset, and both fell into the water. Excitement reigned for a few minutes as the two lads came to the surface and a swimming match was on. Art demonstrated his swimming ability to such an extent that the officers forced him to give an exhibition of swimming and diving before the crowd gathered on ship and dock, and did honor to his Island home by the sea. Art or Sandy as he is known among the boys, will be remembered as one of the real swimmers and divers of Charlottetown, having taken part in several aquatic features of sport. The return trip of the ship embraces Panama Canal Zone, New York, Boston and Halifax.

FEAR FOR OVERDUE SCHOONER Irene Myrtle

BOSTON, Mass., March 31-(By The Canadian Press) - The tern schooner Irene Myrtle, out of Weymouth, N. S., for Bangor with lumber, had not arrived at the Maine port last night. No sailing vessels had arrived in the river yet this season, Bangor reported. Attempts were being made today to trace movements of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia sailing vessels in view of wreckage picked up on the Bay of Fundy shore. The Irene Myrtle, under Captain Tom Anle of Parrsboro sailed from Weymouth on Friday. Heavy southwest winds prevailed after her sailing, and storms in the bay would have delayed her in the ordinary course of events. Moreover, she was laden, while a quantity of fresh hulkwood found near the flotsam indicated the unknown vessel from which the wreckage came was carrying that forest product.
